

PROGRAM FOR FEBRUARY


This month's program will deal with advertising for the Model A. Howard Minners will be our speaker. It has been said that Henry Ford did not believe in advertising. But he reportedly said that advertising was not so much to sell his Fords, but rather to tell people how to use and get the most out of their cars. ... Well, that seems like a bit of a "fine line." In point of fact, the advertising campaign for the Model A proved to be the most expensive ad program ever mounted up to that point in time. In the Spring of 1927, Ford had brought in several advertising agencies, and N. W. Ayer of Philadelphia eventually won the Ford contract. Starting in late November 1927, full page Model A Ford ads appeared in some 2,000 U.S. newspapers, and there was also New Ford advertising on the radio. Magazine ads in the U.S. did not appear until June 1928. Ford's passenger car ads ended in July 1931. However, Ford Model A and AA commercial vehicle ads only began in magazines in March 1930, but they continued into early 1932. Not surprisingly, there were some interesting and amusing advertising "bumps" along the way!

DADDY'S PREWAR EARLY V-8S.

Notice by the cars he traded in, that I don't have a complete set of records. Some time in 1934 after he bought the '34, he splurged and got a radio and then moved it to his 1935 car. 
