So now, at most, any breaking club news will be less than 2 weeks old instead of the 4 or 5 weeks of the past.

National Liaison Howard Minners provided an update on the efforts of MAFFI to solicit money for the Model A Museum. Howard made a motion that criteria be developed for the Peyton Randolph Scholarship, to start in 2012, and the Board would seek Hellen Randolph's thoughts regarding the distribution of the scholarship. The motion was seconded by Edna Cross and the motion carried unanimously.

Annual Meet Chairman Bill Worsham reviewed the upcoming Board of Directors (BOD) nominations for next year and the rules for nominations at the upcoming general meeting that evening. Bill also informed the BOD that almost \$4000 had been raised from the Peyton Randolph Scholarship Auction. Bill will speak with Hellen Randolph to determine what her wishes are as to what criteria will be used for the scholarship.

Youth Development Chair Paul Gauthier said that all of the scholarship awardees have been notified. He indicated that some may show up at the Christmas Party to receive their award.

Acting Membership Chair Greg Shepherd gave an update on his progress with transferring membership records from Woody Williams. Everything has gone well.

Activities Chair Edna Cross said that everything is falling into place for the upcoming Christmas Party. She will encourage members to get their reservations in soon, as there is a limit on the number that the facility will accommodate.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:20 PM.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO

On the cover of the December 1986 Ford Script was an old photograph of a lonely Model A Roadster taken at the Virginia side of Memorial Bridge, possibly as early as 1949. Such pictures often conjure up thoughts like—why was it there?, who owned it?, and caused a curiosity about what became of it. It develops that that very car happened to be instrumental in first bringing together Model A owners in the local area many decades ago, and there is a direc linkage to our present club.



It was parked there over and over and was seen by many, because it belonged to a gentleman named Willard Kidd, who happened to be the Bridge Tender. It was he who opened and closed the bridge when necessary to allow passage of vessels otherwise too tall. (One wonders if the job wasn't a bit like the infamous Maytag repairman's, with lots of idle time, but it is likely he did have some other duties too). The roadster's existence there spurred other owners to stop by and meet Mr. Kidd, and as a result an informal "club" was formed. Later, in 1952, it became a club called "Model A Club of America", with "FORD" in the middle of the logo. As the story goes, this organization preceded the formation of MAFCA, and subsequently relinquished its similar name and became the Potomac Chapter of MAFCA, after MAFCA was formed. Later, our present club chapter was organized and chartered, formed by some who were previously Potomac Chapter members. So, what did happen to that lonesome roadster? Ask Bill Benedict, its his baby now.

The Restorer recently recognized some of our long-time members for their length of membership in MAFCA, and the winners are...... Luke Chaplin and Gerry DeWitt, 45 years! Fred Morse, Ed Simpson, John Shepherd and Bill Worsham, 40 years; Walt Bratton, 35 years; Bill and Marylee Cassels and Edward Brandt, 30 years; and William Cooper, 25 years.

Now, about that club car, the '31 Deluxe Delivery..... it sold! That's all that was mentioned in the December '86 script. More details?? I guess readers would have to be patient to find out.



BROWN BAG CHRISTMAS GIFT EXCHANGE

The December program will again be the rip-roaring Brown Bag Gift Exchange. We will operate under the same rules used over the past several years.

Each person will bring a nice gift, "wrapped" in a brown bag – and this bag will be your admission to the event. Lady-specific gifts should be marked on the outside with a large "L". The bags are placed on a table in front of the room. Each member gets a ticket stub in exchange for his bag. The other half of the ticket goes into a bowl.

"Nice Gift" means "No Junk!" - Find something among your Model A holdings that you would like to get as a gift if you didn't already have it. If you can't find something, a new part or tool in the \$10-\$20 range would be just right. (For example, last year one GWC member purchased two hood prop kits, one for his own car and one for the brown bag gift exchange.)

Then comes the fun! When the meeting begins, a ticket is drawn from the bowl. The holder of that ticket comes to the front and selects a bag from the table, turns around and opens the bag so that everyone can see the gift. When the *oohs* and *ahhs* have subsided, he/she draws a ticket from the bowl, hands it to the Master of Ceremonies, and returns to his seat with the gift. The new number is called out and the holder of that ticket comes forward and announces his/her decision, 1) Take a gift that has previously been unwrapped, or 2) Select and open a new bag. If he/she takes the previously opened gift, then that person (who relinquishes the gift) comes back to the front to 1) take a bag or 2) a previous gift, but not the one just relinquished.

Each subsequent ticket holder comes forward and has the chance to take any previously opened gift or take an unopened bag from the table except that the third holder of a given item gets to keep that item. (Example: Tom opens up a carburetor, Karen takes the carburetor from Tom, Benny takes the carburetor from Karen and gets to keep it).

The fun is always increased when someone opens a gift that multiple people are eager to own. So wrap a gift up in a brown bag and come to the meeting on December 16th ready for a good time. In the end you will go home with a nice gift and pleasant memories.

You asked for a picture of my Model A a while back. What I still have left to do is wire the front turn lights, and title and register the Model A in Colorado. CCPU means closed cab pick-up. Had lots of fun at the St. Paddys Day parade. Don't know why she overheated, except that at the slow speeds it did not get enough air thru the radiator. She did not overheat either going to or coming from the parade. Also, some Model A'ers put a thermostat in the upper radiator hose. The thermostat is supposed to slow down the coolant flow so the radiator can do more cooling to the coolant. There are folks on both sides who say that works and that it does not work. Timing might also have something to do with the overheating. We need to see what Ted says. Parades are hard on clutches, since were are going slower that the Model A wants to go in low gear. Low gear is also a bit noisy.


