

10 years ago. We'd never really talked much before and so I figured it would be a short visit. Boy, was I wrong. As soon as I walked in, he started talking and never stopped for an hour. That was George being George.

When Alice and I were at his funeral Saturday, I got to thinking, not how sad this was, but how lucky we all were that we hadn't had to do this a decade ago. Often God takes people from us and we wonder why they had to die so soon. But 10 years ago, God took him from us but then had second thoughts. Maybe He realized we needed him more down here than He did up there.

George was a person who loved helping people. He couldn't help it; it was who he was. That day in 2002 when he came across that wreck (I may have the year wrong), he just had to stop, even though others were already on the scene. It was just George being George. If he hadn't stopped, then 5 minutes down the highway he would've had a crushing heart attack and died alone on the side of the road. Not a proper way for someone like George to go. Instead, he collapsed at the accident scene in the presence of a nurse who happened to have a defibrillator, and the rest of us got the magnificent and undeserved gift of 10 more years of George helping us and making us laugh.

You will notice that there isn't a lot about George in this month's Script. I've decided that rather than rush around trying to get stories out of his shocked and saddened buddies on such short notice, I'm going to do what I did when we lost another larger-than-life member a decade ago—Ed Wiencek. I'm going to give over half of next month's Script to photos and stories about George and now also John Shepherd. So take your time, dig up those half-forgotten and hilarious stories and send them to me by April 1st. I confess that I couldn't find a single photo of George and his car in The Script photo archives. And I don't remember what John Shepherd looked like, so I may get a more senior club member to go through the photos to help me pick some of him out. TREASURER'S REPORT

Several Board members were busy this month contacting members who still had not paid their dues and because of their efforts, the financial condition of the club has improved accordingly. Year-to-date money-in at the end of February is \$3,977.50 (\$3,370 of which is dues) and money-out is \$2,848.00. The Board approved a \$500 contribution toward MAFFI's Model A Museum Construction Fund and a total of \$8,000 in scholarships (\$4,000 GWC and \$4,000 Peyton Randolph) has been set aside in the 2012 budget. The main money generators for the club include both your dues and the Sully Car Show, so as members we need your continued support/time in both these areas.

In a related matter, I am looking for a sponsor(s) to help defray the cost of our Sully Car Show award trophies. Trophies cost the club over a thousand dollars each year and as you can imagine, they are not getting any cheaper. I think we have been able to find a good balance between cost and quality, so I have to find other alternatives to reduce cost. Later, after a close call in a stopping incident, Fred decided to overhaul the brakes. One thing led to another, and guess what? The car was all apart. Total restoration became the objective, and Fred was determined to use only NOS parts. That proved to be tricky because parts applications were in a state of flux in that early year. Based on these mileages, we have five awards pending for 2011: Woody Williams is due the 2,000-mile award for his '29 Canadian Roadster, which went down the Natchez Trace; Joe Curatola and Andy Jaeger are due 5,000-mile awards—Andy for his '30 Town Sedan, which the Jaeger's also drove down the Trace; Chuck Kunstbeck is due the 10,000-mile award; and Carol and I are due the 25,000-mile award, Cricket being another Trace veteran. Chuck is a drivin' maniac—he just got the 5,000-mile award in 2010 and the 2,000 mile award in 2009, his first year in the program.

The program is sponsored and administered by MARC and one of the requirements of the program is membership in that organization. All mileage accumulated throughout the year counts toward the program. However, mileage accumulated during years you are not a member of MARC does not count toward an award. Janice Barker, the National MARC Driving Awards Chairperson, uses the published MARC roster to determine membership. If a Club member drops their membership in MARC, I do not carry them in the program, though I do maintain their previous data. Should they rejoin MARC, their mileage begins accumulating from their total the last year they were a member of MARC.

Cricket, Carol and I are looking forward to the 2012 driving year. We are planning on attending the MARC Tour in Chattanooga and will probable take our own spring tour someplace. If you're planning on going to Chattanooga and participating in Club events this year, why not make your miles count by joining in the MARC Driving Awards program. To join, you must, as mentioned, be a member of MARC and pay a one-time registration fee of \$1.00 per car. Your car must be of original manufacture (1927-1931), be titled as a Model "A", and be authentic in that it should have an original type four-cylinder engine (1927-1934) and have an original body style for year of manufacture. Awards begin at the 2,000-mile point, followed by 5,000 miles and every 5,000 miles thereafter. Come join the fun and make all those miles this year count. 

SUNSHINE REPORT


As I'm sure most people are aware, we lost George Merkel Sr. this month. Please keep Janet and his extended family in your thoughts.
