

THE GWC 25 YEARS GO

It was over, Sully '87, and we were in heaven! 381 show cars, just a handful less than Sully '12, sixty more in the car corral and 200 flea vendors, which proved to be our most successful show up to that date. Attendance was estimated to have been 4,600 who paid at the gate, a guestimated 1,000 who jumped the fence or just strolled in, and 1,000 more arriving in antique cars. Financially, our take was \$7,500, a pleasing sum, since expectations had been in the 5 to 6 K range. 13 GWC'ers entered their cars for judging and 9 trophies were awarded to them.



President Richard Dove told members that the monetary gains would almost fully fund the club's yearly activities. The show was Sully Plantation's biggest fund raiser, and our involvement puts something back into the community. Richard thanked all who had helped make the show a success. Believe it or not, some members suggested we look for a more generous sponsor.

At the board meeting it was apparent that we were beginning to take a more sophisticated approach to our financial management. A "future-looking budget review" and thoughts of a contingency fund to carry us through possible Sully rain-outs were on the table. Members' ideas were also solicited.

Unusual? A planned kite flying event at Jane and Bob Wild's farm, scheduled in August by activities chairman John Kandl.

Tool chairman AI Meeks thanked Joe Young for lending the club his custom-made tow bar, but he good naturedly pointed out to Joe that there was a statute of limitations, and "possession was 9/10's of the law". Hmmm.

CLEM CLEMENT – LIFE MEMBER

According to our Club's by laws, a "lifetime honorary membership may be granted for outstanding and sustained service on behalf of the Club; sustained excellence in researching, restoring and maintaining the Model A Ford; outstanding and sustained contributions to the Model A hobby and to the Club; [while demonstrating] conspicuous, valuable and sustained helpfulness to other members."

This description fits Clem Clement to a "T" ... or should I say, an "A".

Clem's first association with the GWC was from 1979-1983 while he was on his final tour in the Air Force stationed at the Pentagon. His first post-Air Force retirement job with RCA took him and his family home to New Jersey until 1987. When that job ended, he "followed the money" back to this area, where he rejoined the GWC and got busy making his inimitable contributions to our hobby and our club.

Clem's fascination with and longing for a Model A goes back to when he was a child, but his ownership of a Model A dates to 1975 while he was stationed at Hanscom Field in Bedford, Massachusetts. It was there he found the Pickup he named "Clementine," which he owned until 1987. By the time Clem returned to the DC area, he had sold Clementine and purchased an early 1928 AR Phaeton; a rare car he hoped to restore once he settled back into this area. While working on that project, he needed a driver, so Clem sought the advice of Bill Worsham on a 1930 Cabriolet that had been advertised in the Script. Bill said he knew the car, and that it was solid; it soon became Clem and Sandy's.

Since then, Clem has been extremely active in the club, serving for many years on the Board as Activities Chairman; Vice President and Program Chairman; and President (in 1998-1999). As President, he helped ease the club into the Internet age with its initial web page, while nudging members to begin using electronic mail. He has also provided many articles and photos to our editor for this publication, and served for several years as the Club Historian.

Clem also served the club at Sully as a member of the Flea Market team, the Old Car Parking team, the Front Gate team, the Judging team. For many years, he also served as the show's Chief Judge, with Sandy plugging away at the score sheets helping insure the judging results were quickly and accurately documented.

At the national level, Clem has served the hobby as a Touring Class Judge at one national meet, and a Fine Pint Judge at 2 national meets.

Clem served the hobby as the Chief of the Maintenance Tent Team for the two MARC National Meets held in Williamsburg in 2000 and 2007. In 2000, Clem and his 35 assistants worked tirelessly to get and keep Model As on the road. In 2007, Clem and Woody Williams ran a series of mini-demonstrations on front end and steering problem diagnosis, and timing, distributor, and carburetor adjustments. These hands-on lessons, in addition to their repair tent work, helped get Model As back on the road while at the same time training their drivers how to do that after the meet.

Clem's presentations to the membership at many club meetings over the years have ranged from discussions on the flow of oil inside the Model A engine to the finer points of differentiating among collector model trains. Although these presentations were often humorous, they almost always included spontaneous on-the-spot quizzes... just to make sure that important points stuck.

Clem has always felt that our cars should be seen. He arranged to have our cars become part of the Fairfax Station annual December Train Show, and a more significant part of the Early V-8 Club's annual Fairfax show. Clem the patriot worked hard to get us more involved in shows for our wounded warriors and old warriors at Walter Reed and the Armed Forces Retirement Home.

Clem is also fond of "parading," having participated in Cherry Blossom, Memorial Day and Fourth of July parades in our Nation's Capital.

Of course getting out in the public means researching what's happening in the old car universe beyond the four walls of our club's McLean American Legion Hall home. As Sunshine Chairman, Clem ferreted out important life news, as well as news about well-known shows (e.g. Carlisle and Hershey) and not-so-well-known shows and meets to share with all of us.

Those of us who attend regularly say it epitomizes how Clem and Sandy together have indeed made "…outstanding and sustained contributions to the Model A hobby and to the Club; [while demonstrating] conspicuous, valuable and sustained helpfulness to other members."




HUNTER FANNEY WINS MARC OF EXCELLENCE AWARD

Peyton Randolph Memorial Scholarship Essay

If you ask someone what a car does, you will most likely receive an answer such as "it gets me from point A to point B". However, if you ask someone what a Model A does, the answer will go far beyond the means of transportation.

When I was about seven years old, my parents decided that they wanted to surprise my grandpa with a 1929 Model A Ford for Father's Day. I thought this was a great idea, since my grandpa always had a love for classic cars. There was only one problem. The Model A that my parents wanted to purchase was located in Pennsylvania, while my grandparents' house was located in Maryland. Even though the distance was somewhat of an issue, we decided we would find a way to get the car to my grandpa in time for his birthday. I also started attending classic car shows with my grandpa and the rest of my family. I learned so many interesting things about the Model A such as the fact that it was only produced for four years but during that short time period, over four million Model As were manufactured. This was astonishing to hear. I also learned that the first Model A produced was given to Thomas Edison. I hope to continue to learn more about the Model A every time I visit my grandparents or attend car shows. I also want to start helping my grandpa with restoring his two Model As (he bought another one after realizing how happy the first one made him). So far, I have only helped with cleaning them or fixing small things like the mirrors, but soon I hope to assist with more important repairs.

If I could talk to the Randolph family, I would tell them that winning this scholarship would make my grandpa and me so happy. He's currently helping me pay for college, and I can't thank him enough. If I were to receive this scholarship, it would help show him that I really appreciate all he's done for me. I'm not sure if my grandpa and Peyton Randolph knew each other, but after reading Mr. Randolph's bio, they seem like they would get along great. They were both engineers, both served in the military, and both had and continue to have a great passion for classic cars. Winning this scholarship would prove that great things can come about by simply sharing a hobby with someone important. My grandpa means the world to me, just as I'm sure Mr. Randolph means to his family. Nothing can repay him for the knowledge and help he's given me in my lifetime, but this would definitely help. I'm glad that the Model A was able to bring joy to Mr. Randolph and continues to bring joy to many others. As I've learned over the past couple of years, the Model A is not just an automobile that can take you from point A to point B. It's a contributor to happiness and a creator of memories; and I believe that this scholarship will help spread that message.


