

TREASURER'S REPORT

Receipts for the end of August are \$20,923 against a year-end budget projection of \$21,225, the bulk of which represents monies received from both the Sully Car Show and club dues. Expenses are \$18,196 against a year-end projection of \$25,225, the bulk of which represents expenses for club operations, Sully, and scholarships. I expect we will end the year well within budget thanks again to proceeds from the Sully Show. This year the Sully Show netted \$9,929 for the club which is the third year of steady increases. In 2011 the club netted \$9,614 from Sully and in 2010 we netted \$8,943.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO

Pictured on the cover of the September 1987 Ford Script was a Victoria, excerpted from a magazine ad. This Script issue was dedicated to that Model A body style. It seemed that there were 9 of our chapter members who owned a Victoria at that time, including yours truly. Mine had been discovered by P.P., Honorary Member, and good friend, Joe Thoma. By far it was the sorriest of all 9, but it did have possibilities. Sort of a "barn find", except that there had been no barn for about 8 years, during which time a tree grew next to a fender denting it inward, and the tires had sunk into the ground all the way up to the rims. Fortunately we had come prepared with mounted wheels. When we jacked the tires out of the ground, roach-like bugs scurried out. There were some plusses: there was so much junk piled on the top that, except for the rear window's wood there was no rot! Title? Well, no, but the owns did have a registration card. I obtained a power of attorney from the seller giving me the right to seek a title and the chase was on. One stirring moment occurred when I was advised that the reason the seller was not holding the title was because there was a LIEN on the car! But, in the next breath DMV said since it was from 1939, they would overlook it. Whew!

In the May-June 1976 issue of the Restorer, member Jerry DeWitt wrote a Victoria article with pictures, comparing features of my unrestored leatherback to those of his restored steel back. The article was titled, "Model A Victoria...Beauty that appeals to women's eyes." His comment about mine: "Today's woman needs an appreciation for the restoring hobby when she is asked to see the beauty in a Victoria like this". Well, gee Jerry, thanks...... Aw shucks, we're still good friends.

At the August meeting, Stan Johnson, right, current President of the Model A Ford Foundation, Inc (MAFFI), presented an award to Howard Minners, left, for his long and outstanding years of service to MAFFI. Howard served as a Trustee of the Foundation for a total of 16 of MAFFI's 24 years of existence, including six years as President. Over the years, he and his late wife Gretchen worked diligently on many of MAFFI's collections, including factory photos, magazine advertisements, and upholstery samples. Most of the work to catalog the Model A Ford Engineering Drawings held at the Benson Ford Research Center in Dearborn, Michigan, was done under Howard's presidency. The concept of the new Model A Ford Museum, now nearly constructed, was inspired by Howard's identification of an article showing an ideal Ford Dealership published during the Model A era, and he served as Vice President during the vital fund- raising campaign. Few, if any, people have devoted so much time and energy for the benefit of the entire Model A Community.

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
THE NATIONAL MODEL A MUSEUM UPDATE: BUILDING DEDICATION

The summer is flying by and so is the progress on the Museum. It is hard to believe that we are already in mid-August. The dedication of the building is approaching fast. I hope to see most of you there. All of your hard work in planning and raising money and promoting the hobby is becoming a reality.

Cornerstone Construction is working hard to stay on schedule with the building. Most of the glass is now installed for the front of the building. They are starting to power wash the brick. The tile work on the floor is moving along nicely, but it is a big job! They had 2 weeks in the schedule to lay the tile. Gilmore personnel will seal the tile floor after the tile contractor finishes their work. This will also take two weeks, so we are on schedule, but it will be tight for the drive through photos on Sept. 15th. The back wall is complete except for the cap on the roof and touch up painting. The electricians have put in the maintenance fluorescent lighting, and the theater lights and were finishing outlets [last month]. The first order of bricks for the walkway has arrived!

I know many of you are watching the progress on the Webcam and over the next month there is going to be a lot of activity right up front. They are finishing off the canopy. Then the drainage trench will be dug across the front of the building and curb basins will be installed. The road will be widened and a sidewalk will be installed across the front of the building.
