Thanks to Doug Tomb for preparing the *Script* the past two months while Bill Sims was touring the country.



FROM THE EDITOR


After 12,688 miles on the road this summer, I have returned from Alaska ready to resume my duties following 2 months of Doug Tomb's yeoman efforts to publish The Script while I was gone. He did a great job. Now HE's off on vacation.

Despite all that exposure to the open road, I regret to inform you that, except for my day at the Model A Ford Museum and finding a couple of Model As displayed by an insurance agent in Mena, Arkansas, who drives it once a year in the 4th of July parade, and in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Museum in Calgary, actual contact with a Model A in the wild (i.e.—on the road) was almost nonexistent.

Suddenly, around the bend in the road came a green Model A Town Sedan clipping along at about 30mph. I tried to get him to stop, but the guy was focused on the road and kept on going. We ran back to our site, briefly dried off, and then went to get in the car to pursue the guy, when I spotted a healthy-sized leech clinging to Alice's calf. After several moments of me trying to remove it while she hopped around, we jumped in the car and headed for the RV area, since I'd glimpsed the A leaving the tent area from our site.

There was no sign of him. We stopped the camp host in his golf cart and he told us the guy wasn't camping there. He lived in the nearest town, about 10 miles away, and practically every Sunday drove it across the causeway to this island campground and all through the campground to give it a workout; but if we hurried, we might catch him as he headed home. So we raced to the causeway and for miles we could see ... nothing. He was long gone and the next town was more like a small city, so cruising the streets looking for him would be a waste of time.

On the way back into camp, we stopped a Ranger, who had seen us from his car minutes before as we hopped around our campsite and pulled off clothes to check for more leeches. He said he'd talked to the guy several times and found out he had a number of younger antique cars, mostly from the '50s, but that the Model A was his only "driver." That was the sum and substance of my Model A contact in 66 days: 10 seconds. So, no photos.

Oh, yeah. There was also this, which I ran across outside the Fountainhead Antique Auto Museum in Fairbanks:

As for the rest of the trip?—bears, caribou, elk, moose, whales, walruses, glowing jellyfish, mountain goats, a clear view of Mount McKinley (usually visible just 30% of the time), 23 hours of sunlight, the ice-filled Arctic Ocean (38 degrees with 30mph winds on July 28th), glaciers, emerald green lakes and rivers, mountains, and all kinds of interesting and friendly people. Best salmon dinners ever. I came home with few trinkets but a drawer-full of t-shirts. I feel like Meriwether Lewis. And Alice and I are still getting along!

John Kandl received thanks for contributing to the car games book to be published by MAFCA. By contributing five games, a chapter became eligible for a free copy of the book. John gave 37, provoking the comment that he maybe should write the book. A final thanks went to Al Meeks for completing an inventory of the club-owned property; translation; where the heck did all that stuff get to. A laborious task.

Editor Howard Minners announced that the revision of the club By-Laws had received a very welcome boost by John Howell, who had located the original 1965 IRS determination regarding our tax-free status. They were revised by Howard and would be ready for membership approval at an upcoming general meeting. He also was actively investigating the creation of a club banner and solicited help and ideas from members.

2 current members who joined this month in 1988 were Bill Beardmore and Bill Hunter. Too bad we don't have a 25-year pin, but anyway kudos for hanging in guys.

Jack Melnick

April 19, 1935 - August 21, 2013

John L. "Jack" Melnick, a lifelong Arlington resident who represented the county in the General Assembly during the 1970s and was active in the local legal profession and a host of community organizations, died Aug. 21.

Melnick, who had been battling heart issues, was 78 years old. Born in Alexandria – but only because Arlington did not have its own hospital at the time – Melnick spent much of his life in the county. In 1971, two years after Republicans swept all four House of Delegates seats in Arlington, Melnick was part of a Democratic counterpunch that won all but one of those seats back and saw the return to Richmond of Mary Marshall, a beloved figure in county Democratic politics.

Melnick served three terms in the General Assembly, then in 1977 launched a bid for the Democratic nomination for attorney general, but fell short.

Though he hardly knew it at the time, perhaps the seminal moment of Melnick's life came in first grade at Monroe Elementary School, where he was classmates with Marjory Helter. They later attended Washington-Lee High School (Class of 1953) and, after going their separate ways for college, would be married and raise two sons and two daughters.

Melnick first attended Roanoke College, but said that after years at the 3,000-student Washington-Lee High School, life in a small college town wasn't his thing. He transferred to the University of Virginia, earned undergraduate (1958) and law (1961) degrees, then returned to Arlington to practice law alongside legendary attorneys David Kinney and Ken McFarlane Smith at the firm Kinney, Smith & Barham. He also served as an assistant commonwealth's attorney under the equally legendary William Hassan, an Irishman so temperamental, according to legend, he occasionally would yell at judges who irked him.

Melnick was instrumental in the creation of the Arlington County Sister City Association, was active with the Arlington Symphony and was a 50-year member of the Kiwanis Club of Arlington, the second of three generations of his family to be members.

Melnick also was active in many other community groups, including the Arlington Salvation Army. Later in life, he became an avid connoisseur of early Ford vehicles, owning classic Model A and Model T sedans. Among them was a 1931 180-A Model A Deluxe Phaeton, of which only about 100 remain.

REMEMBERING JACK

On Wednesday, August 21st 2013 at 4:00am, our fellow club member John "Jack" Melnick passed away from complications due to pneumonia and various heart issues. Mr. Melnick had many friends in the club, including me (despite our age difference), and was a tremendous benefit to the club leadership for many years. He also led an extraordinary and exciting life outside of the hobby, even launching a bid in 1977 for the Democratic nomination for Attorney General. I always enjoyed speaking with him and greatly appreciated his praise and trust of me and my life's work.

John Melnick joined the George Washington Chapter in 2005. He already had a Model T, but had always had a soft spot for Model A's. You see, when Jack was at Washington and Lee High School, a friend of his had a Model A and would drive him to school every day in it. He never forgot it. In no time, Jack bought a 1931 Roadster and began getting involved with the club. Besides touring and attending every meeting he could, Jack served as Vice President and Program Chairman in 2010 and 2011.

Around the time Jack's tenor as Vice President was coming to a close, Jack became rather obsessed with finding an ultra rare 1931 Deluxe Phaeton. He had always admired open cars the most, and the Deluxe Phaeton was definitely one of the most beautiful, desirable and rare of all the open cars. Jack scoured the classified section of several national Model A websites and eventually ran across a Deluxe Phaeton in West Virginia. The listing was marked "sold". In typical fashion, Jack called to insure the Phaeton was not available. As it turned out the Phaeton was not sold. A previous buyer had backed out of the deal. As of yet, we had no idea why. Jack saw this as fate. There would be no time wasted. Jack immediately commandeered a truck and trailer and headed to West Virginia with his son Paul and myself.

What we found in a barn in West Virginia was a 1994 MARC of Excellence, MAFCA Award of Excellence, Master Restoration and Henry Award winning 1931 Deluxe Phaeton! Unfortunately time had been unkind to the vehicle. It ran, but just enough to load it on the trailer and head back to Virginia. Mr. Melnick was undeterred by the vehicles mechanical condition. Once back in Virginia, almost the entire drive train was rebuilt for show, and some touring modifications were made as well. John was going to drive this car everywhere he could to show it off. It all paid off for John when the car received a 1st place in its class at Sully Car Show in June of 2012. John Melnick drove the car to work with the biggest smile I've ever seen, at least once a week, until his death.


- 1) The recipient must be new to the Model A hobby, that is, having acquired their first Model A in 2010 or after.
