Board of Directors Meeting March 30, 2016

<u>Call to Order</u>. The March Board meeting was called to order at 7:05pm by President Jim Gray at the Red, Hot and Blue Restaurant Meeting Room in Fairfax, Virginia. (Note: The meeting was delayed one week due to the out-of-town absence of several Board members).

<u>Minutes</u> of the February 25th meeting were approved by Board Members prior to being published in *The Script*.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> A copy of the 2016 budget was distributed to the board. After a period of discussion Stan Johnson moved and Howard Minners seconded a motion to approve the budget as presented in the handout. The motion passed.

<u>Sully Committee.</u> Bill Worsham provided a written report of the status of Sully planning, summarized as follows: Flyers have arrived and been distributed to members. Bill and Carol Benedict will mail over 700 flyers to former attendees. The food vendor contract has been sent to Randy Bartlett. The application for the event has been sent to the fire marshal. The printer has been given the art work for the Sully passes. Bruce Metcalf has sent letters of invitation to all former flea market vendors. A suggestion regarding expanding the types of cars allowed has been received but cannot be approved due to space limitations.

<u>Programs</u>. Vice President James Kolody discussed the coming programs. A tentative list of future programs is as follows:

April – Small Parts Day preparation – There will be tables set up to explain small parts repair. Anyone with a request for a discussion of repair of an unusual part should contact James. Table hosts will be Tom Terko, Luke Chaplin, and Benny Leonard . Electric component testers for coils and condensers, and perhaps armatures, will be on hand.

May – Restoration of Stainless Steel Headlights – The May program will be on presented by Tom Quigley, assisted by others

<u>Activities</u>. Activities Chairman Doug Tomb, discussed Small Parts Day to be held at Janet Merkel's home/garage on Saturday, April 30th.

For the Cherry Blossom Parade on April 16, plans are to meet at the Pan Am Shopping Center on Rte 50 for the drive to the parade staging area at 7th and Madison in DC.

Tentative plans for participating in the April 23rd U.S. National Park Service 100thAnniversary celebration would include a run on the GW Parkway from Jones Point to Gravelly Point.

Current plans for a Club outing on May 15th to the "Aldie Man Cave" followed by shopping and tasting events in Middleburg.

<u>Membership</u> Chairman Greg Shepherd reported one new member, Roy Fouston, has enrolled in the Club. Shep also passed a working copy of the 2016 roster around to Board members for review.

Editor Bill Sims announced that the deadline for the April issue is Monday, April 4th.

<u>National Club Liaison</u> Chairman Howard Minners pointed out that the MARC Membership Meet will be held on 7-9 April in Flint, Michigan. At this point about 80 registrations have been received.

<u>Club Tool Chairman</u> Benny Leonard stated that cleanup and refurbishment of the Club's compressor and storage shed had to be rescheduled due to illness and inclement weather. A new date will be selected and notification sent to interested members.

Scholarship Chairman Tom Quigley stated that the scholarship application forms are now on the web site. No applications have been received at this early date, but the deadline is May 1.

Club Trip to Model A Museum. Stan Johnson reported that the best option to accommodate various requests is to select a date for a multi-car trip to the Model A Museum. It was moved, seconded and passed that the Club would back a plan for a multi-car "convoy" to the museum on the weekend of August 12-15. Individual cars could travel to the museum on August 12th, stay overnight in Battle Creek and visit the museum on August 13th and 14th, then return on August 15th. Individual decisions to extend the trip of any car to include the Early Ford V8 Museum or the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn would be an option for each car..

NEW BUSINESS

Revision of By-Laws. President Jim Gray asked for members to consider being on a committee to recommend whether changes are needed to allow for use of modern means for remote voting and decision making, such as e-mailed voting when needed.

<u>Microphone and Other Apparatus</u>. Progress was reported on purchase of a modern microphone for use in meetings, presentations and games. Cost and capability are being explored, and under consideration is a GoPro type camera for providing images during presentations that make use of small, detailed parts.

<u>Trifold Handout</u>. Tom Quigley had previously submitted an explanatory trifold flyer for use in explaining our Club to people who make inquiries at events and public encounters. A draft was reviewed and some suggestions for change were offered. A final version will be considered at the next meeting.

<u>Gavel and Podium Name</u>. James Kolody agreed to use his cabinet-making expertise to fabricate a Club tabletop podium to be named as a tribute to Joe Thoma, our Club's originator who passed away recently.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO (1991)

It was April, spring was busting out and things were going well for the GWC. . 214 members had renewed, and there were 3 new join-ups. The Ford Script won a MARC Newsletter Award of Continuing Excellence at the MARC Membership Meet in March, a tribute to the good work of Editor Joe Krafft and his assistants Marylee Cassels and Jim Cartmill, and scads of activities were in the planning.



The Memorial Fund was growing—contributions of \$271 were received from 29 generous members, adding to the \$2,000 received previously. A three-member committee from the Board, consisting of Jerry Breedlove, John Howell, and Howard Minners, was appointed to oversee the management of the funds. Their recommendation was for the funds to be kept in a money market fund initially.

Club caravanning in the coming month, according to activity plans, would include even two on the same day--take your choice: one to a picnic/car meet/fashion show in Rockville, and the other a trek to the May Day Festival Parade at North Beach, then a week later off to the Winchester Apple Blossom Festival.

Activities Chairman Andy Pogan announced a new twist this year, instead of a common Clubwide April tune-up day at a central location, members were to help individual members at their homes. Andy also scheduled April 6th for an engine swap at the home of George Merkel that would be videotaped and then be a presentation at the upcoming meeting.

Joe Krafft wrote about taking his wife Alice and their Model A Roadster to Florida on the AMTRAK. All told, it was a bargain compared to the cost of driving a Model A there. The trip began at the Lorton train terminal, where a young lad whose job was to load the car flooded it badly, but then did manage it well once it had cleared. 
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


