Board of Directors Meeting July 27, 2016

<u>Call to Order:</u> The June Board meeting was called to order at 7:05 PM by President Jim Gray at the meeting room of the Red, Hot and Blue Restaurant in Fairfax, Virginia.

<u>Attendance:</u> Board Members present included Jim Gray, James Kolody, Doug Tomb, Milford Sprecher, Howard Minners, Bill Worsham, Greg Shepherd, Benny Leonard, Tom Quigley, and Stan Johnson. Absent were Bill Sims, Jerry Olexson and Bruce Metcalf. A quorum was present.

<u>Minutes</u>: The minutes of the June 22nd meeting were approved by Board Members prior to being published in *The Script*.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> A copy of the most recent financial report was made available to the BOD. Bill Worsham reported that we still have some money due us from the food vendor. Milford Sprecher provided a synopsis of our financial situation. Bill Worsham added that the Sully income was one of the better results that the club has enjoyed over the years. Our total assets were reported to be \$64,867 in the general fund and \$9,302.88 in the memorial fund. A complete report will be available for member's review at the next general meeting.

OLD BUSINESS:

By-Law Revision Committee Appointment: President Gray stated that Jason Cunningham, from the membership, and other board members will begin work soon on the by-laws revisions. The committee plans to recommend minor changes to accommodate advancements in technology, such as the ability to communicate via email and electronic remote meeting technologies. They also plan to offer a plan for distributing club real assets should the club ever choose to disband in the future.

<u>Sully Committee Report:</u> Bob Clubb was recently presented with the trophy for the Sully Staff Award as having his Model T Ford Paddy Wagon selected as their favorite in this year's show. Jim Gray reviewed the policy for presenting the class trophies at the awards ceremony at the end of the day at Sully. The policy is that winners must be present to be awarded a trophy; we do not present them later or have them delivered to the winner after the fact. This policy is in place for both safety reasons (to keep vehicular traffic off the field during the show) and to encourage show cars to remain on the show field while visitors are still arriving so that paying customers have the opportunity to see all the cars. A brief discussion focused on two possible exceptions to this rule from this year's show; one involved a club member and the second a case of sudden illness.

<u>Scholarship Chairman:</u> Tom Quigley stated that the scholarship awards checks have been mailed out. The BOD will discuss the size and number of scholarships to offer next year as we develop our budget for 2017.

Report on Club Trip to Model A Museum: Stan Johnson reported that the planning for the group trip to the Model A Ford Museum (and the entire Gilmore Car Museum) is going well. The group will meet at the American Legion Meeting Hall parking lot at 7 AM on August 19 for the drive to Battle Creek, Michigan. A block of rooms has been set aside at the Baymont Motel in Battle Creek. Each person is responsible to reserve his own room; phone: (269) 979-5400). There will be room for late deciders to join the convoy. Members who are going include Gray, Tomb, Johnson, Quigley, Gauthier, Leydon and several others "on the fence". The basic tour will have the individual cars traveling to the museum area on Friday, August 19, stay overnight in Battle Creek and visit the museum on Saturday and Sunday, then return to the DC area on Monday, August 22.

Programs: Vice President James Kolody reported that the August program will be an explanation of K.R. Wilson tools that the club owns. Each tool and its proper use will be shown and demonstrated. The September program will feature explanations of the Model A Ford electrical system and trouble-shooting techniques. James has identified a PA system which is contained in a carry-on luggage sized container with 1600 watts of power and two 15 inch speakers. Two types of microphones are included for the \$224 price.

Activities: Doug Tomb reported that the near term activities include the Museum trip in August, and the Warhurst picnic on September 11. Tentative schedule calls for arrivals to begin at 10 and BBQ lunch at 11:30. Possibly, some work will be done that day, or later, on the Warhurst Model A. The John Leydon-led tour of the Oak Hill mansion and grounds remains on the calendar for October 23. A full page of future activities was distributed.

<u>Membership:</u> Chairman Greg Shepherd reported that no new members have been enrolled this month. All Membership rosters have been distributed.

Editor: Bruce Metcalf asked Jim Gray to announce that the deadline for the next issue is Friday, August 29. The August newsletter will be produced by Bruce Metcalf, Assistant Editor.

National Club Liaison: Chairman Howard Minners pointed out that the MARC National Meet next year will take place in Gettysburg. Our club has offered to help but the hosts have not yet accepted our offer. Next year's membership meet will be in a small Amish town of Shipshewana, Indiana. Howard advised members to get to Carlisle and Hershey on set-up day to get the "good stuff".

Early December Membership Meeting: Arrangements have been made with the American Legion Hall to conduct our December meeting one week early, on December 14, due to the lateness of the 3rd Wednesday this year relative to Christmas.

We've had some iffy weather on show day before <u>but</u> had never been forced to cancel the show and then reschedule for a later date. 


The report is that Model A's outnumbered the EV8's which certainly demonstrates our superior car guy-ness. Here is a photo from the event:
