GRAY WITH AN A



With 2016 now history, it's time to get ready for a very Model A 2017. At our last BOD meeting on December 21, we bade farewell to Howard Minners and welcomed Jason Cunningham. Fortunately for all of us, Howard's position as National Club Liaison has been accepted by Stan Johnson.

Take note: no other Model A Club in the world, regardless of national club affiliation, can boast of having two such giants of the hobby as members.

Howard's list of achievements is so vast that I've asked Bill to re-run the article Stan provided in January of last year after we'd designated

Howard as a Life Member. From restorer, to leadership positions in the three national Model A Clubs (MARC, MAFCA and MAFFI), to fine-point judge, to expert in upholstery and advertising, Howard is truly a model "Model A" man. This will be the first GWC BOD in 32 years without Howard's sage input; fortunately, we have Stan, a Model A Ford tour-de-force in his own right to assume the position of National Club Liaison. A stroke of luck for us, since Stan, as President of MAFFI, was the driving force behind getting the long-dreamed of Model A Ford Museum sited and built.

As for those elephants I mentioned in my first column in January 2016, we're still nibbling at 'em. Progress has been made on revising the by-laws as I suggested we needed to do, and we've dipped our toe into better leveraging technology to help us manage your Club. One area specifically has been Jerry's foray into using Google Docs for coordinating our budget inputs into a single spreadsheet – BRAVO, Jerry! That's exactly the kind of thinking we need. We've got James, Shep and Jason working on making our Go Pro camera more useful to the membership, and the speaker system we purchased last year has been put to good use several times already. One other big area where I would like to employ technology to make us more efficient and effective is in the judging process at Sully.

According to the exceptionally fine records Woody left us when he stepped down as Chief Judge, we judged 171 cars last year with 51 judges. We missed 19 folks who had signed up, but were unable to make it for a variety of reasons, while other of our judges were delayed entry onto the field by traffic – a problem we'll discuss when we meet with the staff at Sully. Bottom line: we were successful, but it was also stressful. We hope to reduce the stress this year while streamlining and improving the process. Those of us on Bill's committee have already been working on this year's show. As Bill says, all we need is a good day. Look for more information on Sully as we get closer – and yes, we will once again have additional food under the mansion for our volunteers.

And what else do we have planned for this year? James tells me this is "The year of the Engine" for programs, so starting in February, we can look forward to technical talks on things that keep your Model A running strong – like the carburetor, the distributor, timing, choice of spark plugs, tuning your engine, what to use for coolant, the water pump, the lubrication system and other things engine. Meanwhile, our new Activities Chair, Jason Cunningham, presented a FULL CALENDAR of great club activities and local car events to the BoD at our December meeting – go to the web site to see all Jason has laid out for us. I personally am already looking forward to those national parades. Sign up and join us – where else will you get ½ million or more people to look at your car while encouraging you to blow your "Ahooga" horn?

Speaking of activities and events, we have a big national event right here in our neck of the woods this year. The Hub City Club of Hagerstown, MD, will host a MARC National Meet from Sunday, July 30 – Friday, August 4 in Gettysburg, MD. Their web page http://hubcitymodelaclub.com/marc-meet-2017/ indicates many of the available hotel rooms in the immediate area are sold out already, so if you want to go, you may need to start working on a room now. Note that the Hub City Club has not yet asked us to help in any way, but a recent

FROM THE EDITOR



Board of Directors November-December Meeting December 21, 2016

<u>Call to Order</u>. The October Board meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM by President Jim Gray at the home of Roz and Stan Johnson, Springfield, Virginia. The meeting was a combined November-December, as well as a joint meeting of the 2016 and 2017 Boards.

<u>Attendance</u>. Board Members present included Jim Gray, James Kolody, Doug Tomb, Jason Cunningham, Howard Minners, Bill Worsham, Greg Shepherd, Benny Leonard, Tom Quigley, Bill Sims, Milford Sprecher, and Stan Johnson. Absent were Jerry Olexson and Bruce Metcalf. A quorum was present.

<u>Minutes</u> of the October meeting were approved by Board Members prior to being published in *The Script*.

President's Commentary - Howard Minners. Jim Gray recognized Howard Minners, outgoing Board member for his long service on the GWC Board, and his service to the entire Model A community. Stan Johnson reviewed Howard's service to the National Model A organizations, including Howard's long Presidency of the Model A Ford Foundation; his efforts to assemble and organize valuable collections of original Model A upholstery samples, factory photographs and era advertisements for the Model A Ford; as well as supervising the indexing of Factory Engineering Drawings at the Benson Ford Research Center in Dearborn. Also, Howard served for 3 years as Secretary of the Model A Restorer's Club. For this and other work, Howard was presented several years ago with the Ken Brady Award, the top award of the Model A Restorer's Club. Early on in Howard's 32 years of service to the GW Chapter, he served as Newsletter Editor, winning the top MARC award, and more recently has been the liaison between the National Model A Ford organizations and the George Washington Model A Ford Club. His service on the Board will be missed even though he plans to continue full participation in Club activities. A hearty and sincere round of applause followed to show Howard our admiration and appreciation.

<u>Treasurer's Report.</u> Treasurer Jerry Olexson provided an email accounting of the Treasury position as of December 21, 2016. Actual expenditures so far in 2016 stand at \$18,970 (not counting scholarships) compared to actual income \$18,947, a difference of \$23. The Scholarship's funds (five \$1,000 awards to five students) totaling \$5,000 were taken from the Memorial Fund, leaving \$9,052.88 in that account. Total holdings of the club are \$55,496.24. A discussion took place regarding the amount and number of scholarships for 2017. Upon the recommendation of Tom Quigley, Youth Development Chairman, It was decided to keep the number and amounts the same as 2016.

Review of Positions and Transfer to 2017 Officers. Jim Gray reviewed the slate of Club officers for 2017 in which Jason Cunningham will serve as Activities Chairman; Doug Tomb will serve as Secretary; and Stan Johnson will serve at National Club Liaison. All other positions will remain the same as 2016.

OLD BUSINESS:

By-Law Revision Committee Report. President Gray deferred action on the By-Law revisions at this meeting in order to have more time for coordination and planning for the coming year. The suggested revisions will be in line with Virginia state guidelines for non-profit organizations. The two areas of concern are the ability for Board members to be able to vote on key issues even when not physically present at the meetings, and guidelines for dissolving the Club should that ever become

necessary. The State guidelines on disposition of remaining funds, and reference to those guidelines need to be addressed in the by-laws.

<u>Sully Committee Report.</u> Bill Worsham reported that he has filled all positions for the 2017 Sully Car Show. This year's hat pin design will feature the long-time car registration team of Bill and Carol Benedict. Some tweaking of the car classes will be made to accommodate actual cars entered.

<u>Tool Chairman</u>. Benny Leonard reported that maintenance work on the Club Smith Compressor still needs to take place before the Club can sponsor a Sandblast Day.

NEW BUSINESS:

Programs. Vice President James Kolody led a discussion regarding the meeting programs for 2017. It was suggested that a theme for the programs would be beneficial in planning the programs. A tentative list was developed which will be finalized at the January board meeting on January 25th. The theme for 2017 will be The Year of the Engine. A tentative list included:

- Jan Indoor flea market.
- Feb Engine cooling system radiator, fan, water pump, internal cooling chamber, hoses, thermostat.
- Mar Engine oil system oil pump, valve chamber, oil supply and return passages, system pressure.
- Apr Era repair literature taken from era manuals and magazines language, tips, procedures, safety.
- May Sully preparation last meeting before Sully, final coordination, judges training, and recruitment.
- June Distance driving tips/spare parts/tools long distance preparation, convoy tips, recommended spares.
- July Outdoor Swap Meet + prep for Gettysburg National Meet July 31-Aug 4.
- Aug Fuel System/Carburetor gas tank, fuel filter, supply lines, adjustment, carb restoration and operation.
- Sep Coupe Restoration Project review Benny Leonard's review of total rebuilding of his 1930 coupe.
- Oct Engine checks and tune-up compression test, timing, spark plug replacement, overheating, gauges.
- Nov Exhaust system manifold droop and resurfacing, glands, muffler options, back pressure.
- Dec Brown bag gift exchange.

James stated that anyone with ideas, or willing to set up and present a program should email, write or call him.

<u>National Club Liaison</u>. Chairman Howard Minners pointed out that the MARC Membership Meet next year will take place in Shipshewanna, Indiana, 23-25 March 2017. The MARC Annual Meet will take place July 30- Aug 4 in Gettysburg, PA. The latter is a rare opportunity to attend a national meet near to home.

Editor. Bill Sims stated that the deadline for the next issue is Tuesday, January 2nd.

<u>Club Apparel</u>. Efforts continue to get a high-resolution Club logo for use on Club apparel items.

Dec - Fairfax Train Station - December 2 & 3; Annual Christmas Party, December 2.


Jason invited comments and additional ideas. He also mentioned a tour of the Northern Neck of Virginia as a possibility. A refined plan will be developed during the January board meeting.

<u>Membership.</u> Chairman Greg Shepherd announced that two of the sons of Val and Donna Zadnik have joined the Club. Shep has made the new board changes on the Club website. During ensuing discussions, it was suggested that a Club event be planned to drive a group of Model A's over to Jason Dryers home for him to enjoy. Jason donated his Model A for raffling off to begin the Model A Museum fund drive. This event earned \$45,000 for the museum.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:10 PM.

HOWARD MINNERS RETIRES FROM THE BOARD

Howard Minners is now permanently retiring from the GWC Board after more than 30 years of service to our Club. He has been an active Model A Ford enthusiast at both the local and National levels for many years. On the local level, Howard has been an active Model A owner, managing the restoration of his 1930 Cabriolet so well that it won top National Awards, including the *MARC of Excellence* and *Henry Award*, and also the MARC Preservation, and MAFCA Award of Excellence. Howard drove the Cabriolet as a part of the GWC caravan to the MARC-MAFCA National Meet at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin. He has served many times as a judge at the Sully Car Show.



2001, Howard served as the club's Assistant Treasurer and more recently served as the GWC's National Club Liaison.



At the National level, Howard served as the MARC National Secretary for 4 years and is a MARC Senior Judge as well as a Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA) Master Judge, serving at many National Meets. He has been honored in the past by the Model A Restorers Club with the *Ken Brady Award*, the top annual award for service to the Model A hobby given by MARC.

In addition, Howard served for six years as the President of the Model A Ford Foundation, Inc. and later as Vice President and Project Manager. During that time, MAFFI managed several important preservation activities, including indexing the official Ford Factory engineering drawings on file at the Benson Ford Research Center in Dearborn, Michigan. In addition, he and his late wife Gretchen organized and cataloged collections of Original Upholstery materials, Factory Photographs and Ford Advertisements. This expertise was used when they served as fine point judges at many National Meets.

Howard has been a key member of the national Model A Ford Ad Collectors special interest group, which he helped to organize as a Chapter of MAFCA and a Region of MARC. He has served as the group's President and is recognized as an expert in this aspect of the Model A hobby.

In 2015, in recognition of this outstanding and exceptional service to the George 'Washington Model A Ford Club and the National Model A hobby, Howard Minners was awarded the honor of being designated as a Lifetime Member.

LEE DONG

Feb. 18, 1945 - Dec. 24, 2016

We received a sad email from Colorado just the day after Christmas. Lee, a long-time member of the GWC (since at least 1995) had passed away early Christmas Eve morning. But whenever work would bring him back to the DC area, Lee would make every effort to attend a meeting or swap meet and work the crowd getting caught up.

Peggy told us that Lee had suffered from heart disease for many years, and that he was last admitted to the hospital on December 23; he died early the next morning.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO (1992)

The cover story in the Ford Script for January '92 was about the new cutaway engine unveiled at the December meeting. It had been promptly put to use as a visual aid during the distributor and timing presentation made by Millard Springer, Jerry Breedlove, and Don Temple at the December meeting. The engine's brightly painted components were visible through generous size openings, and internal functions could be observed as the engine was hand cranked.




Since a question had come up at the general membership meeting about "piston slap", a two-page explanation about it appeared in the Script. It is the knock caused by the piston moving side to side as a result of forces acting on the piston under the influence of the angularity of the connecting rod as the crankshaft rotates. It went on to say that while it is not possible to prevent the piston from moving from side to side, the noise could be reduced by minimizing the clearance. Thus, the early solid skirt piston was improved by a design dubbed the constant clearance piston, which incorporated a slot in the skirt that controlled the expansion caused by heat and enabled a reduction in skirt-to-cylinder clearance..

Writing in the President's Corner column of the Script, President Andy Pogan said that in looking forward to 1992 we had an enthusiastic and well qualified Board of Directors that had already begun plans for the coming year. Included were to be the popular traditional activities plus some new ones that it was hoped would broaden member participation. Examples of "traditional" are the January Indoor Flea Market and Clem's Train Day, traditional even then, and to this day too. Andy asked Board members to entertain ideas for getting new members involved in their restorations and to make their cars roadworthy. The upcoming Small Parts Repair Day at Walt Bratton's was going to be helpful in that regard. Membership count was reported to be up to 259 with 3 additional members signing up.

Jim Cartmill, who had previously edited a column in the Script based on the Service Bulletins, was considering the possibility of doing a new series, inspired by Millard Springer's comment at the last meeting that there was a lot of information that could be found in the Owner's Manual. He stated he would be using the Floyd Clymer book, "The Ford Model A Service Manual and Owners Handbook of Repair and Maintenance," adding "How's that for a big name?" He would draw on the experts in the Club if and when any conflicts arose or when questions came up.

This month in the Script's swap column, 4 Model A's were offered, 2 roadsters, a tudor, and a fordor with the notation, "Saved from the street rodders." While there were two later-model Ford vehicles for sale, this time there were no "Brand X's." Peyton Randolph offered K. R. Wilson tools, and Julio Rodriguez a filling station gas pump with the top globe glass cracked and needing restoration. (I ended up with it, thus adding one more "cracked in the head" thing around here).


A WINTER'S DAY OUT IN DECEMBER

Throughout the days before the 11 December tour, the weather forecasters kept lowering the forecasted high temperatures for that day. Originally, the prediction was for a clear sunny day in the 50's. But by the time the actual day came around, it changed to overcast and temps would not get out of the 30s. The latter was the case.

Regardless, the intrepid group was determined to complete a year-end tour of the beautiful country side of Northern Montgomery County, Maryland, and Northern Virginia's Loudon County.

The Marylanders left from Rockville, MD, at the site of the regular Sunday morning Shady Grove Cruise In. The group joined at historic White's Ferry, but there was one casualty along the way, as Chuck McDonald's 1931 slant window sedan suffered a blown head gasket on the route. Tom Quigley waited on the Virginia shore in his 1930 Standard Roadster.

From the ferry we tracked through small scenic roads, viewing the rolling farmland and natural settings. In spite of the coolness, it was very pretty. The countryside around Lovettsville and Taylorstown was very enjoyable. At the higher elevations, there was clear evidence of a recent snowfall.

It is interesting to note that all 4 vehicles were "convertibles," lending a wish for this to be named a "ragtop tour". However, "Freeze Your A Tour" might be a better title (especially for those without heaters installed!) Of course, only the modern cars had heaters. The roadster occupants had grit, a suitable replacement for heating! The temperature for the day did not rise above freezing.

The group stopped for lunch at the Aroma Café in Point of Rocks, where we overwhelmed the kitchen's ability to prepare food quickly. For good measure and to amply demonstrate the intrepid nature of our group, we stopped for ice cream at Rocky Point Creamery just outside of town

Tom Quigley separated from the group at the end and returned to Virginia by way of White's Ferry. In addition to the various greeting and smiles seen on the return trip. I could see that others were mouthing the words, "Aren't you cold?" to which I replied gingerly, "Hell yes!"

CURL UP WITH A GOOD BOOK THIS WINTER

"Wheels for the World" is not a new book. It was originally published in 2003, but it is new to me. I bought a copy to read, later learning that the Club library has one that can be borrowed.

I have read a lot about Henry Ford and Ford Motor Company over the years, but one can never know enough. This book, by respected historian Douglas Brinkley, added quite a bit to my knowledge of Henry Ford and Ford Motor Company, and was published in conjunction with Ford Motor Company's 100th birthday and with the cooperation of the Ford family and the company.

I think it is well known that Henry Ford was not an immediate success but was on his third company, which became the Ford Motor Company we still have with us today. Henry was full of ideas and must have had quite an appealing personality that attracted talent and investment to his companies. His first company, the Henry Ford Company, went broke but was resurrected as Cadillac! While persistent, Henry was not known as a particularly hard worker. He was also a great tinkerer but couldn't quite finish product development. With the founding of the Ford Motor Company, he found his stride and almost instant success with the first Model A and then the Model N. His real tour de force was the Model T, a car that was developed as kind of a skunk works project at the company's Piquette Ave. factory.

Equally or maybe even more important to Ford's success was his finance chief, James Couzins. The Dodge brothers were early investors and suppliers, who used the dividends from their stock to start manufacturing their own line of cars to compete with Ford. The amount of money that the early investors made from their Ford stock was phenomenal, even greater than some of the Silicon Valley fortunes we know of today.

In addition to having an inexpensive and reliable car, Ford was also focused on manufacturing efficiency. He may not have invented the assembly line, but he perfected it. He also famously vertically integrated his manufacturing process, in part because he wanted to control all aspects of production and because his suppliers could not provide the quantities required to produce as many cars as he wanted to produce.

His employee William Knudsen left and went to GM and Chevrolet in the late 20's when Chevrolet went from being an also-ran to outselling Ford and the Model T. As we all know, the Model A was a huge success. But the market had changed; General Motors was driving innovation and the Model A was only produced for four years.

The book continues through the rest of Ford's 100 years, chronicling the tragedy of Edsel Ford, the reinvention of the company by Henry Ford II and up through the Edsel, the Taurus and the ascension of Bill Ford as Chairman of the company.

Henry Ford's other pursuits are described, including aviation, Greenfield Village, union relations, his famous anti-Semitism, his isolationism and opposition to both world wars, and his farm experiments, including being an early proponent of ethanol as a fuel.

Henry Ford, Edsel and Henry Ford II are fascinating figures, as is the history of their iconic company. For me, the end of the book lagged a bit and did not have the level of analysis that the earlier chapters did. The company has had many boom and bust cycles, getting reinvented a number of times over the decades. For those who want a good overview, this is an excellent book.
