Board of Directors Meeting February 22, 2017



<u>Call to Order</u>. The February Board meeting was called to order at 7:01 PM by President Jim Gray at the Red, Hot and Blue Restaurant in Fairfax, Virginia.

<u>Attendance</u>: Board Members present included Jim Gray, James Kolody, Benny Leonard, Tom Quigley, Greg Shepherd, Bill Sims, Milford Sprecher, Doug Tomb, and Bill Worsham. Absent were Jason Cunningham, Stan Johnson, Bruce Metcalf, and Jerry Olexson.

President Jim Gray asked for the following Committee Reports:

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Due to the absence of the Treasurer, Jerry Olexson, Assistant Treasurer Milford Sprecher, gave the Treasurer's report. Milford said there had been no changes in the past month. He paid the Club insurance premium for 2017. He reminded the Board that the proposed 2017 budget, which was emailed for Board-member review, would be voted on at the next Board Meeting.

<u>Sully Committee</u>: Bill Worsham provided a Sully update. He is working with the new Sully POC, Erin Rock. Erin is having the Sully Brochures printed up, and that should be available soon. Jim Gray will be the Chief Judge this year, and he is investigating processing the Sully judging sheets via an electronic method.

<u>Programs:</u> Vice President James Kolody discussed upcoming programs. At the March meeting, Beverly Tomb, Eleanor Wilson Chapter Regent, DAR, and other DAR officers, will present recognition certificates to those club members who served in the military during the Viet Nam era. The DAR awards ceremony will be followed by an ice cream social. There will be pie and ice cream for the membership.

April will be the Small Parts Day preparation program. May will be the Sully judging orientation seminar for the membership and those who will help with judging. June will be a long-distance driving seminar. July will be the annual Outdoor Swap Meet. August will be a seminar on the Model A fuel system. September will be a presentation by Benny about the restoration of his Model A coupe. Further programs will be announced in the *Script* and on the website.

<u>Activities:</u> Jim Gray reported for Activities Chairman Jason Cunningham, stating that Jason is surveying the local and regional scene to determine what activities are being planned in which our Club might take part.

In addition to known items like the joint and informal Caffeine Double Clutch with the V8 club, there is a host of automotive and mechanical shows and meets taking place starting in March for possible participation by our Club members. A separate listing will be published in the *Script* for members to choose from, including tool shows, petroleum equipment and AACA shows and swap meets.

The Oak Hill tour has been postponed until a later date. It was suggested that some tours could be made joint tours with local Model T or V8 clubs.

It was previously reported that Jason has already signed up the Club for the Cherry Blossom, the Memorial Day and the National Independence Day Parades. Sign up forms for the Cherry Blossom Parade have been distributed by email, and are available on our web page. More information on signing up and participating will be published in The Script and on our website.

There was also talk of a trip to Kent Island, Maryland, and a Model T Ford driving clinic, at a future date.

<u>Membership:</u> Chairman Greg Shepherd reported that we have sixteen unpaid members who need to send in their dues. Failure to pay on time will result in deletion from the Roster.

Greg noted that the website has been the same. Greg mentioned the online drop box, for pictures and articles for the club. Contact him for details.

<u>Editor</u>: Bill Sims announced that the deadline for the March issue is Monday, February 27th. He again requested that the Board encourage members to send in articles, pictures, and Model A-related stories for The *Script*. Bill reported that the article on fashion was well received by the membership.

<u>National Club Liaison</u>: Chairman Stan Johnson was not in attendance, due to travel. There was discussion about the forthcoming MARC Meet in Gettysburg. GWC Club members are invited to contact Doug Reed of the Hub City Club, if you want to help out. Contact information will be in the March *Script*.

<u>Club Tool Chairman:</u> Benny Leonard announced the planned date for the Club members to come to help with tuning up the Club's air compressor would be April 15th. This is needed for a Club Sandblast Day, which will be held April 22nd. Members who work on the compressor should get priority for sandblasting.

Discussion was held on the proper procedures for submission of a nomination for Honorary Lifetime Membership in the Club, and about the criteria against which each nominee will be evaluated by the Selection Committee.

Membership paperwork for 2017 for both MARC and MAFCA has now been completed.

No new business was brought to the floor.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:35 PM.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO (1992)

At the February meeting, President Andy Pogan presented stalwart member Joe Thoma with the Club's highest award, the Honorary Lifetime Membership, and a plaque in appreciation for his many years of devoted and energetic service to our chapter. Joe was an early member of the Club and was a key element in its establishment, early development and growth. Over the years, Joe had helped many members repair and rebuild their Model A's, both on a one-to-one basis and at weekend workshops. Val Zadnik commented that "without Joe's good-natured help and encouragement at my first brake rebuilding workshop at Millard Springer's several years ago, my Model A might still be rusting away under a tarp in the back yard. Hats off and congratulations to Joe." Candidates for another recognition, the Carl Patrick Award, were to be researched by a committee of three, which was to be appointed by President Andy.

Program Chairman Trueman Burn announced that the March program would be on the starter. Luke Chaplin, our electrical engineer, would make the presentation. Covered would be the various starters used on different Model A's, troubleshooting, and rebuilding procedures to insure that the starter was in good operating condition. A video of it would be made available to those wishing to service or rebuild their unit at home.

In looking through his late mother's personal items, he came across a touching story, dated June 1, 1929. It concerned her wedding day, and how the Model A getaway car had been painted up with "Just Married" in white enamel by mischievous fraternity brothers, and the ensuing chase after the newlyweds. By speedily careening into a side road known for its roughness, the pursuers were eluded. The next day the fraternity's college newspaper carried an account entitled "Workout loosens Ford's stiff joints", recounting the harrowing ride over many bumps, and concluding with, "An oil dip stick was the only missing item."

For sale on the swap page were no less than eleven non-Model A's, ranging from a Rolls Royce to a GMC pickup and a trailer, overshadowing just a measly two Model A's for sale.

We lost one of our own recently and the family was kind enough to provide us with a short write-up. Richard B. Roe, 80, amateur ornithologist, model plane enthusiast, father of two, and a retired marine biologist and administrator with nearly four decades' experience in state and federal fisheries work, died December 25, 2016, from pancreatic cancer.

Born in Newton, NJ, in 1936, Dick spent his entire life as a dedicated outdoorsman and passionate protector of native wildlife. Dick retired after overseeing the modernization of the Fisheries Services' research fleet in 1995. Dick acted upon his longstanding passion for flying—a pastime he described as the least forgiving of idiocy of any you might imagine. His 1943 Stearman, known as "Yellowbird," was for many years a fixture at the Bealton Flying Circus. He served for nearly a decade as a docent at the National Air & Space Museum's Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center as well as chairman of their Library Committee for several years. He was a member of the George Washington Chapter – Model A Ford Club, where he won an award for his 1929 Model A Ford—which, if you're interested in seeing it with your own two eyes, was featured in the 2011 film "J. Edgar."

Survivors include his daughter, Alexandria Roe; his granddaughter, Isabella Salamone; and the Caribbean fish species carrying his name. His beloved wife, Andria Jane Clark Roe and his son, Robert James Roe, predeceased him.

Membership Report



"WRAPS" FOR FORMAL EVENTS

By Janet Gundlach-article taken from the MAFCA website

During the Model A era most furs were worn during the day time except for evening perhaps an all-white or black single fox. In the 1930-1931 *Newton Annis Detroit Furs* catalog, only one coat, a slightly below knee length white Ermine coat, was displayed with a formal evening dress.

So what was worn for formal afternoon or evening events? The lady would wear "wraps" of jackets, coats or capes that varied in length and style as to year. The formality of the event determined the fabric.

- ←The cape to the left appears in *Butterick Quarterly Magazine*, Spring & Early Summer 1928. "One solution of what to wear with the down-in back frock is the cape shorter in length." Pattern #1933
- → The cape to the right and above right appeared in the *Butterick Quarterly Magazine*, Spring & Early Summer 1928. The description is for an "Evening cape of light weight velvet" or "suitable for evening or afternoon wear." Pattern #1685. The June 1928 monthly handout showed a coat with a similar collar, Pattern #2051, "the crushed collar on this straight wrap is particularly correct for evening wear." The recommended fabric was Moiré silk.







- ← Butterick Monthly, October 1928, department store handout. The coats to the left are Pattern #2210. The one to the far left is "to wear over the irregular hem, the new shortened evening wrap with a straight collar." The fabric recommended was metal cloth with fur banding. The second view is longer with a "mushroom collared version" of velvet and fur banding. The mail order catalogs sold imitation fur banding and the higher end catalogs sold real fur collars and cuffs.

"Pale pink taffeta makes a straight line cape with little circular flares. Darts fit the wrap very snugly to the shoulder." The pale green wrap appeared in a "Celanese" ad inspired by French designer Molyneux. Both are Pattern #2437. Wraps for Formal Events.











Very few of these "wraps" have survived.
Consider visiting TheFrock.com. They often display these wraps for sale at exorbitant prices.
Other times they can be found on eBay. If you are just looking for a wrap for your sleeveless dress for club events or banquets, consider checking Kohl's or Fred Meyer (Kroger stores). They both had short velvet and metallic little jackets this past holiday season. Since this is past, visit donation or consignment stores. For a summer dress consider making a shear cape to complement your dress. MAFCA Pattern McCall 5990 could be made as an evening coat.

Four years of Wraps have been shown in this article to give you a brief education to know what to look for to complete your "coordinated apparel" category for judging or just to enjoy wearing.

<u>Purpose</u>: To recognize, thank and honor United States military veterans who served during the Vietnam War.

Eligibility: Living United States veterans who served on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces at any time during the period of November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of location, are eligible to receive one lapel pin.

Presentation: These lapel pins will be presented in a dignified manner to each Vietnam veteran during public events held in their communities by Commemorative Partners.

Accompanying remarks should reflect the nation's thanks for their service and sacrifice. In the rare instance when an honoree cannot attend a public event, the pin may be presented during a private ceremony.

Symbolism:

- Eagle The eagle represents courage, honor, and dedicated service to our nation. As one of the most recognizable and notable American symbols, it is emblazoned with distinction on numerous military insignia.
- Blue Circle The color blue matches the canton of the American flag and signifies vigilance, perseverance, and justice. The circle shape and blue color also match the official seal of the Commemoration.
- Laurel Wreath A time-honored symbol representing victory, integrity, and strength.
- Stripes The stripes behind the eagle represent the American flag.
- Stars The six stars represent the six allies who served, sacrificed, and fought alongside one
 another: Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, the Republic of Korea, Thailand, and the
 United States.
- Message "A Grateful Nation Thanks and Honors You" is embossed on the back, closest to
 the heart of the wearer. Also, the official name of the Commemoration is included to remind
 each veteran that this is a national initiative, and this lapel pin is the nation's lasting memento
 of thanks.

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
