




President's report:

In addition to the allure of bounteous food and drink for which GWC was prepared to lay out up to \$10 per attendee, there were also to be car games, other sports, and a best-dessert prize contest. Furthermore, an upfront cost to members of \$5 per reservation would be REFUNDED upon arrival.



But then there were negatives. The site for the Pig Pickin' chosen was a bit remote, especially for Virginians, who constituted a majority of the Chapter's membership. It was being hosted by Dick and Kitch Eisenman in the Chesapeake Beach area, Dunkirk, Md. and necessitated traversing some roads with high speed limits. Lots of our cars were "garage queens" that would have to be resuscitated in order to show up. So what do you think, was President Andy Pogan's challenge to members attainable, and was it met? Then the time came for the moment of truth--will it run better--no more backfire? YES! But 15 minutes into the running and OH NO! Black smoke, wouldn't idle, missing terribly-- Can't BE! Carburetor just rebuilt, must be something else--possibly a stuck valve, bad condenser, intermittent shorting out? Compression and electrical checks said no. Well, maybe it IS the carburetor....". And it was, a combination of a speck of "gremlin dung" in the idle jet and a bad, though new, float valve. Solved at last! Maybe the lesson here when trouble persists is to go back over what you have just done rather than assume it's a new problem caused by something else.

Pat Roberge wrote about and sent pictures of Model A's encountered in his trip to one of Maine's more remote areas. After having to settle for sightings of an old Continental with a brush paint job, a few Falcons, and a '57 Rambler settling into a rhubarb patch, he finally hit pay dirt—a retired AA dump truck with petunias planted in the bed and a contractor's two model A's; a utility A with a homemade covered body and a '31 pickup, both serving continuously for 30 years!




MAFFI NEWSLETTER MINUTE

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2017 MARC NATIONAL MEET IN GETTYSBURG

The MARC National Meet in Gettysburg was too close not to attend. I went to Niagara Falls two years ago, intending to drive my town sedan, but that was cut short due to an exhaust pipe problem. I was not going to let that happen again!

A group of us headed from suburban Maryland up to Gettysburg. I drove to Tom Terko's house, where we met up and headed north on Georgia Ave. At Sunshine, MD, where New Hampshire Ave. intersects with Georgia Ave, we coincidentally met up with Hunter Fanny, who was driving his Henry-award-winning coupe to the meet and was to meet up with the rest of the group with us. At the intersection of 144, we met up with a group from the Baltimore club, led by Dave Sturges. Dick and Betty Fisher and a couple of other cars showed up, so there was a caravan of seven on the way. The trip was uneventful, except when Dave turned off 140 onto 97 at Westminster and the second car continued on 140, with the rest of us in tow. Once the error was recognized, we turned around and finally all got back together and headed north. I went to college in Westminster, so I know Carroll County pretty well. We continued through Union Mills and Silver Run, up to Littlestown, PA. The trip reminded me of one car that got away.

Right after college, there was an old guy who lived near Silver Run who had an unrestored '28 or '29 pickup. It was still his daily driver, but I made him an offer on the truck that he accepted. Just out of college, it took every bit of my savings, but I wanted another Model A and thought this was the right one. At the last minute, he changed his mind because, supposedly, of the gas crisis, which was then upon us. I wonder where that truck is now?

Our group followed 97 to Gettysburg, getting on Rte 15 for a few miles before getting off at Rte. 30, York Rd, to go to the Gateway complex.



There were dozens and dozens of Model As there. Meet registration was close to 500. I didn't count how many cars were registered, but there were a lot. I had hoped to take my roadster, but it is in the middle of some brake work, so it was not ready to take. My town sedan performed admirably the whole trip.

There was nothing planned for Sunday evening, so we checked into the hotel and scoped out the cars,

raffle rooms and the like. Over the course of the next couple of days, we ran into Benny Leonard, Howard and Brad Minners, the O'Neals, the Olexsons, the Worshams, the Cartmills, Jim Gray and John Leydon, so our club was well represented.

The Hub City club really did a great job hosting the meet. There were lots of activities and seminars. I think I attended all the seminars, which I enjoyed. I learned more on the judging standards for windshield wipers to last me a lifetime, however. In addition to the seminars, there was a talk about a 1918 Packard truck from WWI, followed by a demonstration of the truck in the parking lot. Other nights featured a Civil War reenactor and the PBS film on Henry Ford.

Shuyan and I did not go on any of the battlefield tours. I have been to both Gettysburg and Antietam a few times, so I didn't think I needed to go. I wanted to attend the seminars, which conflicted with the tours, so I was happy staying close to the complex.

In addition to the seminar on wipers, there were seminars on oil and fuel, both presented by MARC president and former fuel engineer with Texaco Joe Valentine. There was also a seminar on modifications to Model A carbs for cars with air filters and a presentation on a French Model A. Brad Minners participated in the French Model A seminar and showed us a photo of the Model A Paris taxi that he has purchased. Wayne Suker of the Hub City A's hosted a talk on front ends and steering that had us all imagining problems with our cars by the end of the seminar.

Monday night featured a nice reception at the visitor center, where there was food, the film of the battle and the cyclorama of the battle for us to view.

We ventured off site for most of the meals, where we saw lots of Model As running around town. At one restaurant we went to, there were 16 Model As in the parking lot, so the economic impact of the meet was felt on the town. We made a side trip to Gettysburg College and took a short walk around the campus.

Wednesday night featured the Fashion Show. After attending the Niagara Falls meet, Shuyan and I decided that we should look for some vintage clothes to wear. She found a fantastic period original dress on eBay soon afterward that we bought. As is the norm for me, I waited until the last minute, but was able to purchase a suit that I wore the night of the show. Music for the fashion show was provided by Howard Minners on piano and ukulele. We got many compliments for our costumes. The fashion show was followed by an ice cream social, a tradition at MARC meets.

Fine point and touring judging was held on Wednesday afternoon. I am sorry that I did not get to look at either the touring or fine point judging. Fine point judging was held in a tent, and most owners moved their cars out of the tent when the judging was over, so I missed most of that. Our own John Leydon had his Woodie in the FP judging and performed well!

As usual, there were some fantastic cars at the meet. There were some nicely restored AAs, including a '27 panel truck, an air compressor truck, a pickup truck and a flatbed. There was one town car, some 400As, woodies and just about any Model A configuration you could hope for. I was impressed by a nicely restored 1932 Model B someone had brought.

A few thunderstorms rolled in during the meet, but didn't really put a damper on activities, as they mostly hit us during the night. There was a forecast of hail on Friday night, which had owners scrambling to move or cover their cars.

The Repair "Tent" was under an overhang on the side of the Wyndham. It was pretty busy during the meet, handling all manner of repairs. The MARC youth group also worked on their chassis and drove it around parking lot.

The Grand Tour on Thursday featured a nice route through apple country with the group ending up at the South Mountain

Fairgrounds in Biglerville for a chicken barbeque and the chance to wander around the fairgrounds. One of the tractors on display was a Ford Deere, made from a kit during WWII, featuring a Model A engine and John Deere parts. On the way back to the hotel complex, we took a detour for a tour of the first day's battle and came across a monument for the 75th Ohio Infantry, a unit organized by my kids' 3rd great grandfather at the outbreak of the Civil War.



Friday night featured the banquet and awards. In addition to the Fine Point and Touring classes, awards were given for the person who drove the farthest, and the oldest and youngest female and male drivers. There was also a "hard luck" award, which was given to the wife of the winner of the longest trip award. No word on how she got back home after that one! Dick and Betty Fisher of the Baltimore club were recipients of the Ken Brady award for their work on the MARC Mileage Program.

Our group, diminished by two cars, headed back south on Saturday morning. The group included four coupes and my town sedan, so there was a lot of uniformity of car styles. Dave Sturges and Hunter Fanny were a bit hard to keep up with on the trip back, especially on the hills.

Congratulations to the Hub City club for an outstanding meet, even more impressive in that the committee consisted of six people. Many other members of the club did a great job helping with AV, organizing the repair tent and with the raffles. Unfortunately, I was not a winner in any of the raffles, despite having purchased a bunch of tickets for the can and other raffles.

The next meet is in Branson, MO, probably too far for me to drive and attend all within one vacation, but an event to look forward to, nonetheless.



A SHORT TRIBUTE TO TOM KORTISSES



As many of you know, the last two frame-up restorations that Tom Kortisses – the Bratton's consultant who died suddenly in June - finished were cars that member John Leydon urged him to complete. John rented an apartment up in Westminster, MD, and spent three years there, with Tom as teacher and restorer. The first project was the gorgeous '31 68C Slant-window Cabriolet that took its first trophy straight out of the block at the Sully Plantation show that year. The second (also a Sully winner) was the completion of former member Marvin Myers' 1930 Woody Wagon that Marvin and Tom Terko had begun.

This year John decided to take Tom Kortisses' last full project –

the Woody Wagon he christened "Baxter" - and bring home a MARC Award of Excellence as a final tribute to Tom and his workmanship. John says: "Can't tell you how many people came up to me at Gettysburg gushing over what an exquisite piece of work that one turned out to be". Baxter was one of the highlights of the meet. And, of course, he rolled home with a well-deserved MARC Award of Excellence congrats Tom and John! Kudos to both of you, and Peace to Tom.
