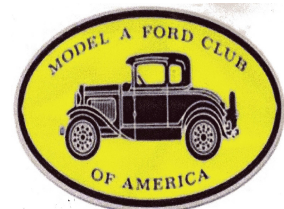

Board of Directors Meeting April 24, 2019



Call to Order. The monthly meeting of the Board was called to order at about 7:15 pm by President Doug Tomb, in the meeting room at the Red, Hot and Blue Restaurant in Fairfax, Virginia.

Attendance. A quorum was not present. Those Board members present were: Doug Tomb, Paul Bjarnason, James Kolody, Benny Leonard, Luke Chaplin, Jim Gray, Bill Sims, and Jamie Lucas. Not present were: Greg Shepherd, Milford Sprecher, Bill Worsham, Jason Cunningham and Bruce Metcalf.

Minutes of Prior Meeting – Minutes of the prior meeting of the Board were published in *The Script*.

Agenda – Prior to the meeting President Tomb circulated via e-mail an agenda, which was followed during the meeting, as discussed below under each area of responsibility.

Sully Show Update – Jim Gray provided an update on Sully planning, which Jim said was going well. Nineteen out of 45 flea market booths have been filled. Jim turned in \$90 to the Treasurer. Efforts are being made to arrange activities to encourage more traffic to the flea market area, for the benefit of the vendors.

There are plans for after the Sully show to request the Park Authority to increase the Club's share of Sully revenues, beyond the current amount. Rande Young will be the chief pin salesperson at the Sully Show. Club members Tom Quigley, Stan Johnson, and Jim Gray helped Club member Tony Hawker to get his Model TT Ford truck up and running, and loaded in his trailer, so it could appear at the Sully SpringFest this weekend (April 27th). This is to help promote the Sully Show on Father's Day.

Scholarship Program – President Doug Tomb reported that Carol Randolph told him that in the near future she planned to make a donation to the Club for a scholarship fund in memory of her father, Peyton Randolph in the amount of \$3,000 - \$5,000. The Board discussed the criteria for how the scholarships could be awarded and accounted for, pending further discussion with the donor. Donations of this nature must be handled and awarded according to the wishes of the donor and the Board will endeavor to obtain an understanding of the conditions of the gift prior to its being received from the donor.

50/50 Drawing – Bill Sims reported that we collected \$28 from the 50/50 drawing at the Club meeting last week. The amount was double, because Rande Young generously donated the 50% she was entitled to.

Script – Bill Sims reported the deadline for this month's Script is April 29.

Treasurer's Report – Treasurer Paul Bjarnason reported the Club's current cash position and made available a copy of the final Board-approved 2019 Budget.

Activities - Activities Chairman Jason Cunningham was not present. There was brief discussion of deferring some of the tours to the fall. President Doug Tomb said he would check with Jason to see if there's any update which could be reported to the members via e-mail, if necessary.

Programs - Program Chairman Luke Chaplin reported that all of the meeting program slots for the remainder of the year have been filled. Jim Gray will hold Sully judge training in the May meeting and June will feature the Model T rescue led by Milford Sprecher. The remainders will be reported on the Club's website.

Refreshments - Coverage for monthly meeting refreshments has been filled in and is set out by Greg Shepherd on the Club website. There was discussion of how well the system in place is working. No changes were proposed, except that it was noted that diet soda was needed for future meetings.

Membership & Webmaster – Membership Chairman Greg Shepherd was not present, so his report is deferred to the next meeting.

Club Property Manager (Tools) – Property Manager Benny Leonard reported that there would be a small parts/social day probably May 25, details TBA.

Youth Chairman (Scholarship) – Youth Chairman James Kolody reported that no scholarship applications have as yet been received. A reminder e-mail will be sent to the membership to encourage applications.

National Club Liaison - National Liaison Chairman Jamie Lucas reported there was nothing new to report this time.

Adjournment - The meeting was adjourned at about 8:30 pm.

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THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO



Discussions at the board meeting held at Robert Mechner's home included the idea of issuing 25-year pins to those who had belonged to our Club that long, a proposal to sell Sully t-shirts that year, and whether to continue inviting outside speakers to give seminars at our meetings. The pin idea was put on hold because of the quantity that would have to be ordered to have the pins made up. T-shirts would have to wait too because it was too late to do it for '94, and maybe it should be smoked over to assure it would in fact be profitable. The board agreed that having outside speakers was informative and that it should be continued.

Jim Cartmill gave recollections of his and Carol's trip to the MARC Annual Membership Meet in Cincinnati, which held for them an additional unexpected happening, a tornado that frightfully touched down nearby. In addition to the meet itself and all its goings on, there was a most memorable side trip to the home of Carle Garrett. Jim said that at the home you were greeted by a stainless steel framed sculpture of the Ford Quail in the circle of the entrance drive. Beyond the Quail, the front doors of the home opened to a living room complete with a '29 Town Car parked in the middle of the floor. Downstairs Carle had created a replica of a Ford dealership right down to gold leaf lettering on the windows, matching gas pumps on either side of the main entrance door, a street light, and a beautiful Ford neon sign on the corner of the building. There was a sitting room, an office, a parts room and a showroom with about ten Model A's on display!

Rick Menz gave insights about judging, in which he had participated at two National MARC Meets. His area was the judging of tops but the principles he elaborated on apply to all areas. Reviewing the Judging Standards in detail before attempting to judge is essential, and even after the information has been thoroughly reviewed before the meet, he said it helps to keep on hand a copy of the chapter applying to the specific area for reference during the judging. Authenticity and the quality of restoration are the prime objectives. It is very important to maintain consistency as it is the key to credible and defensible judging decisions. He said judging for him is a very rewarding experience that's loaded with fun, serious thinking and tremendous satisfaction. For those interested in becoming a judge, he recommended that the MAFCA Judging Standards tests be taken to get prepared.

Three Model A's, a Mercedes, a '66 Mustang, and a Corvair were offered for sale in the Classifieds, plus a full page of Model A parts for sale by Tom Shaw, which possibly was the largest parts offering by a member ever.

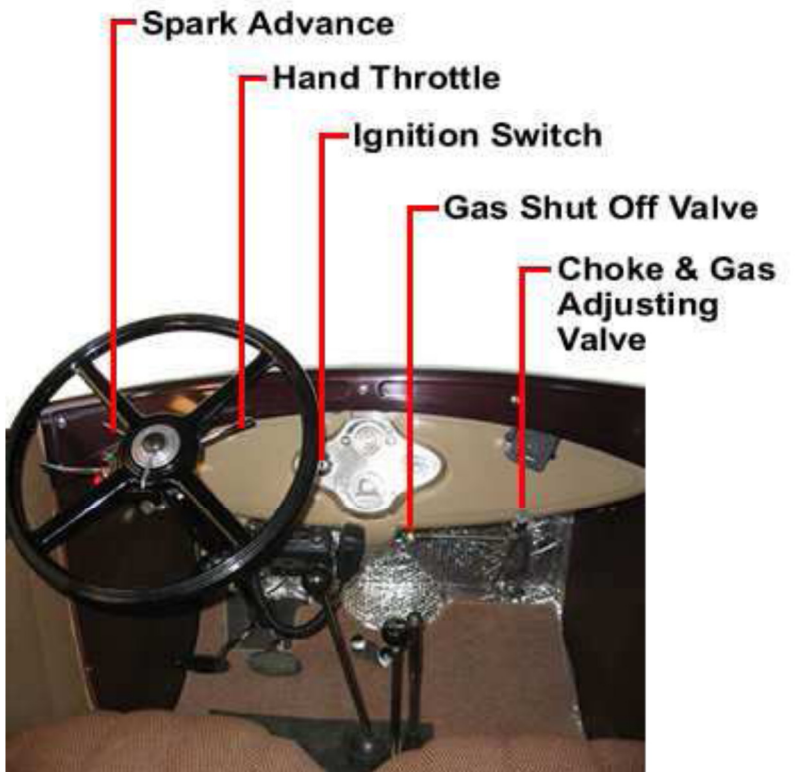
SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION DEADLINE IS FAST APPROACHING—MAY 10TH!

1928-1931 Model A Starting Procedure



1. Engage emergency brake by pulling back on it.
2. Push lever left of steering wheel (Spark Control) all the way up (Retard)
3. Pull lever right of the steering (Hand Throttle) half way down
4. Turn Gas Valve under dash on passenger side to open (Pointing down)
5. Turn Choke Control Valve (under right side of dash) full clockwise and back off $\frac{1}{4}$ turn. If it's quite cold out, it may be better to open a full turn.
6. Turn Ignition Switch on (clockwise)
7. Push in clutch and put Transmission in neutral
8. Pull Choke Control out
9. Turn engine over 3 revolutions – Choke in on 3rd revolution
10. When Engine starts – push Throttle Lever (Right Lever) up
11. Put Left Lever all the way down. (Depending on how your engine is timed, 3/4 down might be better.)
12. Allow Engine to warm up. (The accelerator pedal will need to be used to keep engine running until it warms up.)
13. Turn Choke Control (actually GAV) clockwise to smoothest operating condition.
14. When starting an engine that is already warmed up, omit Choke steps.
15. Always put Left Lever (Spark Retard Position) all the way up when starting and then down when driving.
16. Have Fun Driving!


MY CARBURETOR IS LEAKING!

Tom Endy is a well-known Model A mechanical expert. He lives in California and edits *The Victoria Bustle*, the newsletter of the International Model A Ford Victoria Association. In the January 2017 issue he set forth a problem that many people misdiagnose. That problem is a persistent drip coming from the drain plug of the Zenith carburetor.

Tom explains the problem this way. "When the float valve does not hold sufficiently, the fuel level in the reservoir rises. At the same time the fuel level also rises in the main jet and cap jet until it spills over the top. It then runs into the throat of the carburetor and out through the small hole in the bottom of the throat. From there it runs back to the hex plug on the drain boss and drips off of it leading people to believe there is a fuel leak at the drain boss . . .".

So if you have a drip coming from the drain plug, and you have tightened it once, consider that the source might be a leaky float valve jet.

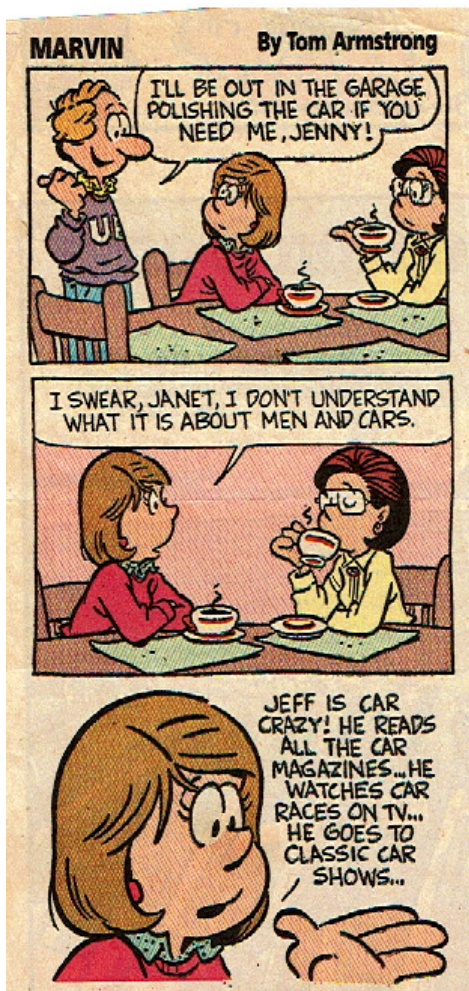
