

#### REPORT FROM THE BOARD ZOOM TELECONFERENCE

# Board Meeting April 2021



The meeting, via Zoom, was called to order at 7:05 PM by President Doug Tomb. Present were Doug Tomb, Luke Chaplin, Stan Johnson, Paul Bjarnason, John Dougherty, Gene Rainville, Bill Sims, Greg Shepherd, Milford Sprecher, James Kolody, and Bruce Metcalf. Absent was Benny Leonard.

President Tomb introduced the issue of returning the Club to normal in-person monthly membership and board meetings. A **motion** was made and unanimously approved to have the next board meeting be in-person. The location will be determined by Doug Tomb and Stan Johnson investigating and deciding between *Milos* (McLean) and the *Red Hot and Blue* (Fairfax).

Another **motion** was made and unanimously approved to have the May membership meeting via Zoom and the June Meeting to be held at the McLean American Legion Hall, featuring a talk by Jim Baker. Jim Baker has not yet confirmed his availability for this date and venue.

The meeting programs planned for the coming months include the following:

May (via Zoom) - Transmission disassembly and assembly, James Kolody

June (in person) – Past travels in a Model A, Jim Baker (tentatively)

July (in person) - Summer Swap Meet

President Tomb asked that members step forward and offer to give a presentation at a future meeting. Contact Programs Chairman Luke Chaplin at *lukechaplin@comcast.net*. Some discussion took place regarding the Club sponsoring a potential out-of-town guest speaker.

It was decided to re-institute the "Swap Meet Table" at all in-person Club meetings.

President Tomb stated that there needs to be a Welcome Committee designated to assist new members into becoming fully active members of the Club. A roster of volunteer committee members will be established.

John Dougherty reported that there has been no response to latest email on 21 April from John Dougherty to Randy Jueben of the Fairfax County Risk Management Office.

Future activities (tours, parties) planned for reactivation was discussed by Gene Rainville. Two near-term possibilities are a tour of the George Washington Distillery, and a possible tour to Oak Hill. A multi-day trip to Orange, Virginia, is a possibility in the summer/fall.

The status of venues for the annual Christmas Party was discussed. The Fairfax American Legion status is unclear due to redevelopment in that area. A possible substitute is the Knights of Columbus Hall but food would have to be catered from off-site.

Bill Sims announced that the deadline for input to the May Script newsletter will be May 3.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:35




# MAFFI NEWSLETTER MINUTE

# **TOURING WITH THE SANTA CLARA VALLEY MODEL A CLUB**


