

FROM THE SMOKE-FREE ROOM

George Washington Chapter Model A Ford Club of America Board Meeting July 12, 2022

Vice President Milford Sprecher called the delayed June GWC Board meeting to order via Zoom at 7:09 PM. In addition to Milford, present were Doug Tomb, Stan Johnson, Gene Rainville, John Dougherty, Greg Shepherd, Bill Sims, James Kolody, Benny Leonard, and Paul Bjarnason.

VP Sprecher opened the meeting with compliments to John Dougherty and his team of 80 volunteers for the great work done in putting on the 2022 Father's Day Antique Car Show at the Sully Historic Site. The weather was very good, the show cars were glamorous, and the viewing crowd was large and enthusiastic.

John Dougherty reported that food sales were good. There was a slight shortage of judges and other key positions due to illnesses (e.g.,Covid), but that the support of the Early V8 Club and Model T Club helped make it a very successful event. He noted that the cooler temperature caused the bottled water sales to be down by 200 bottles, a fair trade-off for the good weather.

While final assessment of the event is not yet complete, John noted that there are some areas open for improvement. Solving the back-up of show cars is one area to be improved, perhaps by having cars in line fill out the forms before reaching the registration tent. A better PA system is needed for the awards ceremony. The Flea Market/Swap Meet vendor numbers were down and work will begin immediately to establish a system of advance notices to vendors. It was also noted that the show field grass could be cut shorter to make walking easier in the future.

Bill Sims reported that T-shirt sales were less than expected, perhaps due to the location of the sales effort. Thirty-five shirts have been sold for an intake of \$700. A new location, perhaps in the Swap Meet area, will be considered for next year.

Paul Bjarnason reported that a full accounting of the income from the show will be made when the final checks from the food vendors and other sources. Projections are that the club will end the year with a balance on hand slightly larger than it was at the beginning of 2022. This is despite the significant charitable distributions made this year.

Milford brought up the stipulation made by the Model A Restorers Club that their insurance only covers people who are MARC members in addition to GWC membership. It was decided to put an advisory article in the Script to let members know.

FROM THE SMOKE-FREE ROOM (Cont.)

The delay of the June Board Meeting to July 12 resulted in a decision to not have a July Board Meeting, normally held on the fourth Wednesday of the month.

Gene Rainville discussed upcoming activities. Thirty-six people have signed up for the post-Sully picnic. Gene plans to order food for 40. The picnic will be from Noon to 5 PM on Saturday. Volunteers are needed to help with set up beginning at 11 AM.

The annual outdoor Swap Meet will take place on September 10th at the Fairfax (not McLean) American Legion parking lot.

Benny Leonard agreed to check to see if the Warhursts are willing to host a late fall event at their home.

Gene stated that he will emphasize attendance at the Model A Day at the Museum but include on the schedule the 46th Edgar Rohr Memorial Car Meet slated to take place Saturday, September 17th in Manassas. Attendance at either is an individual decision.

The need for a nominating committee to begin selecting officers for next year was discussed. Key member Greg Shepherd has plans to move to Ohio in 2024 and would like to begin turning over some of his Membership functions to his successor, so this future position vacancy that needs to be addressed. Also the recent illness of President Luke Chaplin and other members suggests nominating action needs to begin soon.

Milford adjourned the meeting at 8:25 PM.

JULY PROGRAM - BURTZ MODEL A ENGINE

For the GWC July program, we had a special treat; a presentation on the new Burtz Model A Block, by the manufacturing manager for the block, John Lampl.

Thinking about program ideas, I had thought about checking with Terry Burtz, who is responsible for the design and creation of the reengineered Model A engine. Because of Zoom, we now have the opportunity to get presentations from people who are remote from the club. Our first instance was when we had Ken Ehrenhofer make his presentation on the MAFFI Model A bus restoration project.

I sent an e-mail to Terry and asked if he could make a Zoom presentation to the club. He responded that the manufacturing manager for his block lived in Leesburg and that I could get in touch with him to make a live presentation to the club! I was surprised that we had such a resource so close to us, so I contacted John and he agreed to make the presentation to the club and to bring the block and other parts to the meeting! What a great opportunity!

It took a little scheduling to find the time when he could come talk to us and that was for the July meeting.

John is not a Model A expert, but he does manufacturing in China and could arrange to have the block made in China. Apparently, Terry had worked on getting the block made domestically, without success. He heard about John, who had experience remanufacturing a Jeep engine, and got him involved in the Model A engine project.

The manufacturing is done at a factory in China where engine blocks are made for many auto manufacturers. The Burtz block is not a high volume operation, but John's manufacturing connections in China made it possible to have the Model A engine made there in a modern, high volume facility.

Terry's goal was to manufacture a replacement Model A block that looks original on the outside, but is made from more modern alloys, has five main bearings, a pressurized oil system, a new counterbalanced crankshaft and other improvements. Terry laser-scanned the exterior of a Model A engine and developed a casting that will pass fine point judging at the Model A club judging.

The new block is designed to use all stock Model A parts as bolt-ons, including head, water pump, oil pan, etc. The basic dimensions are identical. The goal was to have the cost close to the cost of a rebuild.

Some of the improvements include:

5 main bearings instead of 3
2" bearings with the rear main shortened
Commonly available insert bearings
Pressure lubrication to 16 bearings
5 replaceable cam bushings
Larger Model B size intake ports
Streamlined 135 degree intake ports
Thicker main webs
Thicker water jacket walls in areas prone to cracking,
Thicker upper deck between exhaust ports and cylinders
Main caps located with dowel pins

The connecting rods are redesigned and made of forged steel. They are balanced in sets of four. There is also a new camshaft design made of nodular ion with 5 bearings. It has an induction hardening advantage with no stress risers. An original camshaft can be used if desired. There is also a new flywheel design, balanced and drilled for a V8 9-inch pressure plate.

JULY PROGRAM - BURTZ MODEL A ENGINE (Cont.)

They have prepared a new cylinder head design with a 6.5 compression ratio and a 140cc heart design combustion chamber with resized water passages to divert cool water to the rear of the head.

Steve Becker, of Bert's Model A in Colorado, agreed to be the third party evaluator of the test engine. The engine was assembled and tested with a stock oil pump but it had no oil pressure. They replaced the stock pump with a modified pump and had low oil pressure. This was due to the fact that they inadvertently left an oil galley plug out of the engine, so the oil pressure was essentially the same as a stock Model A engine.

They ran the engine at 3100 RPM for 6 hours and ran it at 2000 RPM for 5 hours. They put the engine in Steve's coupe for a hill climb up Lookout Mountain for 5 miles at a 6 1/2% grade. They car performed the climb admirably.

The team has sold around 500 of the new blocks. Many are in service and there have been no issues that have developed so far with the engines. One block was returned due to an appearance issue due to a poor casting in one place on the block.

The cost of the new block, crankshaft, and rods is \$4,000. A 5% discount is available to the club as the presentation is considered a sales event.

Terry is responsible for the design and engineering, John is responsible for manufacturing, QA, and import and distribution. There is a third individual who is responsible for business management of the enterprise.

The presentation generated a lot of guestions and the attendees were impressed with what they saw.

They will keep this ordering window open to the end of September. The shipping cost is significant, so if they can ship multiple orders, the savings are great. If anyone is interested in buying, we can combine the orders and save on the shipping.





Jim's Tech Tips

"Mounting Wheels"

I know that my Dad reads these Tech Tips, so today's is a special shout out to him, who taught me this Tip for mounting wheels when I was about 12 years old. Thanks, Dad!

Start with a classic X-style lug nut wrench. If you don't already have one, mine is 20" across and works quite well.

Place the wheel/tire next to the vehicle, leaning it against the hub and brake drum you plan to mount it on. Adjust the jack so that the wheel needs to be lifted an inch or two onto the studs.



Now slip two of the tire iron arms under the tire, one arm to the left of where the tire touches the ground, and the other arm to the right. Grab one of the tire iron arms that is pointing out toward you, and lift the tire up with one hand while you guide the wheel to hang on a stud or two with the other hand.



Hold the wheel in against the drum while you lower the lug wrench and use that free hand to start a lug nut on one of the studs. Once you have that lug nut started, you can let go of the wheel and start the rest of them. Use the tire iron to run them all in snug, then lower the jack and tighten them all again.

This Tip is not just applicable to mounting a wheel/tire on a Model A. It works on pretty much any vehicle: car, truck, trailer... In fact, the larger and heavier the wheel/tire is that you are putting on, the bigger help this is.

So in the shop or out on the road, use a simple tire iron to help you lift a wheel up into place and hold it there while you start the lug nuts.



Jim's Tech Tips "Check Your Rear Axle Nuts"

Every time I have a rear wheel off of a Model A, I use the apportunity to check the tightness of the rear axie nut for that wheel. They are supposed to be quite tight, and yet I find many with at least one axie nut that is loose. This is not good. If the hub is able to move on the axie, it will cause excess wear to the end of the axie and can damage it to the point where the axie will need to be replaced.



To check it, first remove the cotter key. With the transmission in 1" or Reverse gear, and the opposite rear tire on the ground, you can apply a wrench to the axie nut and confirm it is tight.

Ford did not publish torque values for ruts and bolts; he counted on the experience and "feel" of expert mechanics to know how tight to make things. Les Andrews has a value of 125 ft-lbs, in his book for this rut, and I feel that is a good target to shoot for. Watch the position of the cotter pin hole relative to the slots in the axle rut. If the pin will not line up on the rut, keep tightening the rut until the cotter pin goes in. Bend the ears over. I use a new cotter pin every

This simple maintenance step will help you avoid bigger problems down the road.



- Stock vehicles, Class A, must reflect equipment available for the year and model vehicle except for minor upgrades and safety modifications.
- Modified vehicles, Class B, must be 25 years old or older based on the vehicle's state registration.
- Post 1997 vehicles, whether stock or modified, are in Class C
- Vehicles may be displayed as the owner wishes within the space allotted and must not interfere with other participants or the flow of traffic. Hoods must be open for best of show judging.
- All vehicles must have a fire extinguisher.
- Vehicles must be driven onto the show field under their own power
- Once parked, vehicles must remain turned off until the meet is over at approximately 3:00 pm.
- Vehicles needing to exit earlier must be escorted off the field.
 Contact a Bull Run member to arrange escort.
- Cars with "For Sale" and/or "Raffle" signs must be in the Car Corral and registered for the show as such.
- Results of the vote tally are final.
- No alcoholic beverages are permitted.
- No food sales unless authorized in advance by Bull Run Region.
- Pre-registration fees are non-refundable except for show cancellation by Bull Run Region.

DIRECTIONS All show vehicles must enter Prince William Street from Grant Avenue GPS Directions use 9500 Liberty Street Manassas, VA

From I-95: Travel I-95 to Exit 1528 - Route 234 North (Manassas). Drive about 14.5 miles and make a right at the second light onto Business 234. Drive another 2.5 miles and take a right at the light onto Prince William Street, (before railroad underpass) — follow signs to show car entrance

From I-66 (coming from the west): Travel I-66 to Exit 44 - Route 234 By-Pass (Manassas). Drive about 6 miles and make a left at the light onto Business 234 (Dumfries Rd.) Go another 2.5 miles, take a right at the light onto Prince William Street, (before railroad underpass) — follow signs to show car entrance.

From I-66 (coming from the east): Take I-68 to exit 53A and follow Rte. 28 south, 7.8 miles into Manassas. Turn left onto Grant Ave. (Business 234), go under railroad overpass and left onto Prince William Street at first light. Follow sign to show car entrance.

From Prince William Parkway (Dale City / Woodbridge): At Liberia Avenue light (where Parkway makes left turn) continue straight onto Wellington Rd. Go 1.3 miles to Grant Ave., and turn right. Turn right at second light onto Prince William St.; follow signs to show car entrance.

Trailers: Instructions above are for show cars. Trailered cars should enter into the Osbourn High School parking lot off Main Street, just south of Prince William Street. Show cars can then be driven to the show entrance. From Osbourn HS. Make right turn onto Main St and go to Church St, left turn onto Church St, then turn left at the light onto Grant Ave (Business 234) go under the railroad overpass and turn left onto Prince William Street at first light. Follow signs to car show entrance.


