

Step by step (virtual)demonstration

- Prime and paint the part to be wood grained with the base coat
- Lay out wood graining tools and apply ink to the template
- First pass – start at one edge and work across the piece
 - Remember the large roller has only 14” by 3” pattern to apply
 - Apply wax paper covering pass one
- Second pass – apply second and following patterns using the same technique
- Using a pencil (shaved to a dull screw driver point) edit any cross-overs of EACH INDIVIDUAL GRAIN! This takes patience
- Re ink the template and keep it moist – never let it dry out.
- The result will be spectacular!
