I think some of us saw a club hero at work on the Natchez Trace tour and his name is Doug Cox. Many of you know that Doug lives in Huntsville, AL and came up a few years ago to provide support of our repair tent during the MARC National Tour where he and volunteers from other clubs as well as our members did a great job. Doug volunteered to do the same thing again for the Natchez Trace tour but things were a little more complicated. First, his wife Sandy had a medical problem and was unable to accompany Doug and his son was returning from his fifth tour in Afghanistan and Iraq (an American hero). Doug honored his commitment to the tour and arrived on **Friday** to set up the repair tent. Doug worked basically alone (no support from any of the local clubs) from **Friday** afternoon through **Monday** morning using his tools and spare parts trying to repair all sorts of Model A problems. Some of the problems were simple like trying to get grease in a fitting to some that were so serious that Doug told the car owners not to drive their car because it was not safe, and they actually followed his suggestion. The only time he was absent was when he went to pickup up his son coming in from the Middle East who is now stationed at Ft Campbell. I thanked Doug for helping me, I know others thanked him for working on their cars; even the car that went home on the trailer. When you see Doug, when you receive an email from him, please thank him for doing a wonderful job helping others and representing our club so well at this national event. He even looked good in the blue 2009 MARC National Tour Repair Tent t-shirt.



Natchez Trace Tour:



Many tour members arrived at the same time so lunch took a long time and we weren’t able to stop at some of the trails and scenic overlooks as we went to our next stop in Canton, Ms. Woody and Tom visited with a couple in their 80’s and gave them a ride in the roadster. Wednesday we traveled our last leg of the Trace which took us to the Mississippi Art Center for shopping and to Clinton, Mississippi where we ate at a new café on its second day of business. Several antique stores lured us in to check out their treasures. We arrived at the Host hotel in Vidalia, LA which was on the banks of the Mississippi River and the view was wonderful. The closing group dinner was catered by a barbeque restaurant from Natchez and was very good. However, there were no centerpieces, no entertainment and no program.
