## THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO

For our 25 anniversary celebration Bobby Harrington had contacted the White House, asking if our outing could be held on its lawn. A good try, but it was no dice. Nevertheless, a pig picking picnic to celebrate our 25th was definitely in the planning, and was projected to take place in October. A variety of events being considered included a road rally, car games, prizes, and lots of food.



At the board meeting, Membership Chairman Jerry Breedlove reported that 4 new members brought our total to over 240. President Peyton Randolph noted that total MAFCA membership was also up by 1,024 to 12,979. The need for more Sully judges was discussed and it was voted by the board that persons entering a vehicle for judging would also have to become a judge, but for another class.

Howard Minner's son Brad reported in on his four week inter-term course in antique auto restoration at McPherson College, located in a small rural Kansas town about 200 miles west of Kansas City. He explained how he and the others in the class were given a Model T to hack away at, and by the time their session was over, some of them actually were able to drive it around.

The college also offered a two year degree for those who wanted total immersion, such as Past President Richard Dove who attended, and went on to be a member of the faculty, which he is to this day. It was said that students in other programs at the college referred to the restoration guys as "autocrats".

The August program was on rebuilding the Trico windshield wiper motor, conducted by John Kandl. Members were encouraged to become somewhat familiar with the wiper's anatomy and by reading up on them in the Judging Standards.

The wonderful MAFFI Museum is now open, and is destination of many Model A'ers, and the subject of numerous current articles. Funny thing though, organizationally it didn't start out to be what it became. To clarify, it seems that the original concept for a Model A museum dates to 1985, when an organization named the "MAFCA Foundation" was formed.

GWC Chapter's John Shepherd and Howard Minners were there from the beginning, and Howard and our late member John Dingle were life members. A few years later President Edie Jones announced the organization had grown to 500 members and \$20,000 was in its account.

It was said however, that MARC's feathers were perhaps a bit ruffled by the prospect of a museum being under a MAFCA banner, so in order to widen appeal to members of both national clubs, the Model A Ford Foundation, MAFFI, was formed and took over the museum dream. The rest is history, what an amazing accomplishment, the entire Model A community has reason to be proud!.

The club's heritage in charters and photographs

The commemorative handout, put together by Charlene and Gil, Bill Worsham and Woody Williams, contained a history of the club, summarized here:

We can trace the origin of the GWC MAFCA / MVR MARC to 1949, when a club known as the Model A Club of America (MACA) was founded by Willard Kidd and Jack Knowles among others. Willard was the bridge tender at the Memorial Bridge, and he drove his 1931 Deluxe Roadster to work. That car is now owned by Bill and Carol Benedict, and Bill drove it to this celebration.

The Model A Restorers Club (MARC) was formed as a national club in 1952, and the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA) was formed in 1956. Two years later, in 1958, MACA became the Potomac Chapter of MAFCA.

The Mount Vernon Region of MARC was chartered in 1962. Several members of both clubs decided to form a MAFCA chapter in the Mount Vernon area of Virginia. The George Washington Chapter of MAFCA was chartered on May 11, 1963 with a limit of 17 members. Ten years later, member Mac Spears proposed that this limit be repealed, and on November 23, 1973 it was, with membership being opened to anyone with an interest in the Model A. A new Board of Directors was elected that day, with Joe Thoma elected President; Bill Worsham, Vice President; Bill Condon, Sr., Secretary; and Andy Jaeger, Treasurer. Bill Condon, Sr. started our regular monthly newsletters the following January 17; which were continued later by John and Jenny Dingle.

Andy Jaeger and Bill Condon, Jr. organized our first annual car show, which was held at Jerry's Ford in Alexandria, Virginia on May 9, 1974, and featured 75 cars. At the same location the next year, Andy and his team drew 150 cars to display. Unfortunately... or should I say very fortunately... the dealership felt they could only handle 100 cars, so we were forced to find a new location.

Bill Worsham chaired our next show on June 13, 1976 at Sully Plantation in Chantilly, Virginia, where 38 annual shows organized by Bill have been held since. This show, now held annually on Father's Day, routinely features between 300-400 cars; is the financial heart of our club, and is a significant source of revenue for the Sully Historic Site, part of the Fairfax County Park system. This car show is also recognized as one of the most beautifully sited and well-run shows in the area. This year's show, on June 16, 2013, was our 40th Antique Car Show.

On February 2, 1978, the George Washington Chapter subsumed the Mount Vernon Region, MARC charter and became a dual MAFCA/MARC club. Later that year, on June 28, the club hosted the 10<sup>th</sup> annual MAFCA national meet at the Thomas Jefferson Center in Arlington, Virginia with John Dingle serving as chairman. Later that year, Andy and Ellen Jaeger hosted our 10<sup>th</sup> annual picnic at their lot on the Potomac River. This lot, now the site of their beautiful home, is the location of an annual picnic to this day.

*The Ford Script* was first published in September, 1980, by Dave Meyersburg; its first electronic version was introduced in January, 2011.

One of the club's adventures in the 1980s was its purchase of a Special Delivery Model A at Hershey. The wrangling and angst over this club car project resulted in a few frayed nerves, a stronger set of by-laws, and ultimately a stronger more cohesive club.

The club celebrated its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary in August, 1988 with a huge pig picking; this "pig picking" remains an annual tradition. Over the years we have travelled the highways and by-ways of the local area, with tours to the Shenandoah Chapter of the Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA) meet in Winchester, Virginia; covered bridges; antique centers; and historic sites as destinations. Jerry Olexson, a 36-year member who served the club as Secretary and Treasurer at various times, as well as Chairman of the Sully Flea market and Car Corral for 18 years, recalls coming home from work one day soon after he got his first Model A in 1977, a 1931 Deluxe Tudor. His decision on refreshing or restoring stared back at him; a posse of then-young club members had removed the body from its chassis and begun the disassembly. After overcoming his shock, restoration followed, and Jerry drives that car to this day.

The club has several events it has participated in for many years, including the Antique Car and Train Shows hosted by Clem and Sandy Clement; Small Parts Day, and indoor and outdoor flea markets. More recently, Woody Williams has organized a series of overnight tours to out-of-the-way areas of interest and historical significance, while Janet Merkel's Shenandoah weekends have gained a big following. Both Woody's and Janet's tours have become highlights of tour schedules not only for our club, but for several other clubs from Williamsburg to Staunton, Virginia to Baltimore, Maryland. In fact, Woody's success in tour organization led to our club's selection to host the *first* MARC National Tour in Charlottesville, Virginia from September 20 - 23, 2009, with Woody as Chairman. The tour, with over 250 cars, was a great success, and created the template for national tour meets that have followed.

Club members have participated in numerous National Cherry Blossom Festival, Memorial Day, and Fourth of July Parades, as well as local holiday and community celebrations. We've also worked with other local clubs supporting the Antique Auto Assembly at the National Armed Forces Retirement Home, and several Wounded Warrior events. In March, 2011, club members and their cars worked for director and car enthusiast Clint Eastwood in filming his movie *J.Edgar* in the Washington DC area.

We elected our first lady President, Charlene Beckner on December 2, 2010, and she directed the organization of this, our 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration, on July 21, 2013.

In addition to the five past Presidents, Andy and Ellen Jaeger were honored for their long service to the club. Andy for being the longest continuous member of the club, and Ellen, our resident "vest Betsy Ross", who has sewn countless numbers of our hallmark yellow vests over these past 50 years. We should remember that Andy initiated our annual car show tradition, and has served the club in numerous capacities over the years. We also must remember the Jaeger's selfless sharing of their little bit of heaven on the Potomac with all of us for our annual post-Sully picnics.

The "Godfather" of the GWC MAFCA / MVR MARC, Bill Worsham, was also honored both at this luncheon and at our last Sully show for all he has done for the club, for Sully and for the Fairfax County Park Authority.

Ashley Williams was the youngest driver to receive MARC recognition for driving her Model A. Ashley, a multiple winner of scholarships from the club, is now doing graduate work at the University of Florida in Gainesville on a full scholarship, while working as a Teaching Assistant. Ashley is one of the many recipients of the \$23,500 in club scholarships awarded since 2009. In the picture on the right, Howard Minners, our National Liaison, is presenting Stan Johnson with this year's highest MARC award, the Kenneth G. Brady award. Stan received the award for making the dream of a world-class Model A Ford museum a reality – raising over \$1 million in donations and pushing the project from inception to completion. It's fitting that Howard, a past recipient, presented this year's award, for he was instrumental in getting the project started before Stan took over from him as President of the Model A Ford Foundation, Inc. (MAFFI). These three club members personify the drive our members have demonstrated in both preserving the past and shaping the future of the Model A Ford hobby; not just for our club, but for Model A aficionados everywhere.
