FROM THE SMOKE-FREE ROOM

Board of Directors Meeting February 27, 2019



<u>Call to Order</u>. The monthly meeting of the Board was called to order at about 7:00 pm by President Doug Tomb, in the meeting room at the Red, Hot and Blue Restaurant in Fairfax, Virginia.

<u>Attendance</u>. A quorum was present. Those Board members present were: Doug Tomb, Paul Bjarnason, James Kolody, Benny Leonard, Greg Shepherd, Milford Sprecher, Jamie Lucas, Luke Chaplin and Bill Worsham. Jim Gray, Bill Sims, Jason Cunningham and Bruce Metcalf were not present.

<u>Minutes of Prior Meeting</u> – Minutes of the prior meeting of the Board were published in *The Script*.

<u>Agenda</u> – Prior to the meeting President Tomb circulated via e-mail an agenda, which was followed during the meeting, as discussed below under each area of responsibility.

<u>**Treasurer/Budget**</u> – Prior to the meeting via e-mail, Treasurer Paul Bjarnason circulated a draft budget to the Board, which was the starting point for the discussion. The draft circulated contained a nominal deficit of \$145. During the meeting, the principal points of discussion included:

1 - the large operating deficits of the past two years and the need to "correct the ship's course" by presenting a balanced budget to the membership,

2 – the level of desirability for continuance of the scholarship program at some minimal level;
3 – whether refreshments should be provided at no cost at the monthly general membership meeting; and

4 – the extent to which the Club should subsidize membership activities, including tours and the Christmas Party.

Points of unanimous agreement were:

1 – the budget should be balanced;

2 – Sully is a "wild card" that, depending upon profits or losses, could give rise to later adjustments to the budget categories, up or down;

3 – at Sully, two \$500 scholarships should be awarded; the touring deficit should be cut from \$2,000 to \$1,500;

4 – the donation to MAFFI should be cut from \$1,000 to \$500;

5 – a single \$700 budget line item for "picnics" should replace the multiple picnic listings;

6 – refreshments would be provided at the general meetings at no cost but a tin can for refreshment donations would be set out and that donations received would be collected by the refreshment coordinator to offset his out-of-pocket costs for the night;

7 – the nominal \$145 deficit would be divided by deducting \$50 from the Treasurer's budget and \$95 from the president's \$500 "miscellaneous" budget; and

8 - depending upon the Sully profits or losses, the touring and picnic subsidies will be revisited post-Sully.

FROM THE SMOKE-FREE ROOM (Cont.)

The Board voted to amend the Budget as modified, by a unanimous vote of the Board members present. The Budget is approved.

<u>Activities</u> - Activities Chairman Jason Cunningham, was not present. The Board agreed that at the next meeting it would like a discussion led by Jason of how the touring finances would operate, with a view towards making the tours self-funding, i.e., those members going on a tour would pay their own way, except for incidentals (e.g., bottles of water, hospitality room supplies) and advancing funds to reserve rooms, if need be. It was recognized that a minority of the membership benefits from the tours and, therefore, in fairness to the majority, a large subsidy by the Club should be avoided.

Programs - Program Chairman Luke Chaplin led a discussion to fill in the upcoming general membership program, noting that the February meeting was cancelled due to bad weather. The following programs were agreed on: March – Luke on Model A electrical systems; April – Doug on Touring; May – Judging (for Sully) – leader unspecified; June – Milford on Model T rescue; July – flea market – August and later meetings remain open and volunteers are needed.

Coverage for monthly meeting refreshments has been set and is set out by Greg Shepherd on the Club website.

<u>Membership & Webmaster</u> - Chairman Greg Shepherd reported that we now have 150 active paid members, which is down by 16 from last year. A few more may come in, still.

<u>Sully Show Update</u> – Bill Worsham was at the meeting, while Sully Chairman Jim Gray was not. Bill noted that plans for the various show functions are still in the formulation stage, especially staff. Bill noted that it will be important to have volunteer sign-up sheets at the upcoming general membership meetings and a special point should be made to encourage the general members to volunteer. Milford reported on his publicity efforts, particularly through venues that do not cost the Club anything. Benny passed out stacks of Sully brochures to those Board members who thought they could place them in advantageous places to publicize the show, such as at car shows preceding the Sully Show date.

<u>Club Property Manager (Tools)</u> – Manager Benny Leonard reported that he would organize a Sully sign clean up and repair day, probably in April.

<u>Youth Chairman (Scholarship)</u> - Chairman James Kolody reported that March 28 is the date of the car show and down-hill derby, from 1:30 - 4:30 at Gunston Middle School, where he is a teacher. This will be publicized to the Club via e-mail, soon.

Editor – Editor Bill Sims was not present.

National Club Liaison - National Liaison Chairman Jamie Lucas reported that he is continuing his efforts to catalog upcoming car show events. He requests that anyone who knows of a show to report it to him. The ones he has catalogued so far will be shared on the Club website.

Adjournment

A motion was made and seconded and the meeting was adjourned at about 8:45 pm Paul Bjarnason

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO

Bill Worsham's "Looking Back" column reviewing the Club's activities 10 and 20 years prior gave the following, which vividly illustrates the progress the GWC made in 10 years;



1984 - The program for the March meeting was a talk on the correct oils and lubes for a Model A. It was announced that a brake day was being planned in the near future, a tune-up day was set for May 20th, and members were urged to sign up for Sully. We expected 400 cars to attend. New members included Bill Benedict, Jim Cartmill, and Del Puschert.

An "Oops I Forgot" entry provided a list of those who had forgotten to pay their dues, 41 slow pokes at that. We did, however, usher in three new members, who presumably had to cough up at the git go.

A Skinned Knuckles magazine article about driving with the manual spark lever was reprinted in the Script. It went on to say if you are curious about that lever on the left, start playing with it while you drive. Move it up and down and observe the way the engine acts. Note the best idle setting, the best fast cruise, and try all speeds in between. How does the position of the lever relate to speed? How does it relate to power? Best fuel economy? The spark lever position sets the spark timing with respect to the position of the piston. Lever up means the spark is ignited when the piston is exactly at the top of the cylinder. This is termed top dead center (TDC). When the lever is fully down, the spark is advanced to fire 20 degrees before the piston reaches top dead center. (BTDC). The conclusion is this: move the spark lever in proportion to speed for best running performance and advance fully for best economy.

Our biggest need is still for **VOLUNTEERS!** We included a volunteer sheet at the back of the February *Script*, but only got 4 of them completed and returned. We need more. So we've attached a volunteer form at the back of this month's *Script*, so that you have another opportunity to support your club. If you've not sent us a completed form, please do it as soon as you get this Script.

Remember, if you work at least 2 hours at the show, you can register your car for no charge, get a flea market space <u>or</u> choose to get 4 entrance passes. The Benedicts and I will all be at the March meeting, so you can fill out your volunteer sheet, register a car (or two!) and get those passes if that's what you choose.

We began work on this year's registration brochure with the Sully staff on January 10; and they've delivered them ahead of schedule. HONORING OUR AUTOMOTIVE "HOLIDAY"

At the request of the SEMA Action Network (SAN), a resolution (H. Res. 108) was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives to recognize July 12, 2019, as Collector Car Appreciation Day (CCAD). H. Res. 108 is sponsored by Congressional Automotive Performance and Motorsports Caucus House Co-Chairs Rep. Bill Posey (R-FL) and Rep. Sanford D. Bishop, Jr. (D-GA). The date marks the 10th commemoration in what has become an annual event to celebrate and raise awareness of the vital role automotive restoration and collection plays in American society.

Intended to celebrate the classics of the past and the future, the U.S. Congress has helped launch CCAD by introducing resolutions each year at SEMA's request. These Congressional leaders have been strong advocates for the automotive hobby in Washington, D.C., and recognize the integral role collector cars have played in fostering our nation's appreciation for the automobile's unique historical place in our history.

A list of officially scheduled events to commemorate America's time-tested love affair with the automobile is posted in the link below. Individuals, car clubs and business owners interested in publicizing events may submit the details of their July celebration at no cost to SAN.



States, local governments and Canadian provinces have adopted similar commemorative declarations, making it an international recognition of the collector-car hobby and the millions of individuals who support it. Several jurisdictions are pursuing similar initiatives.

GRAY WITH A GRAY – A TOURING OR A PHAETON?

In researching the 1923 Gray Touring I recently purchased in Dallas, TX, I came upon an interesting article in the November 2, 1922, *Motor Age*. The article, "Touring Car Versus Phaeton," was written by George J. Mercer, a member of the Standards Committee of the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE).

The article specifically addresses the change from "Touring Car" to "Phaeton", but also discusses the terminology accepted for use in referring to body styles after the SAE Standards meeting that set the names for automobile bodies developed after the beginning of 1922.

First, the coupe.

The very first coupes weren't American, they were French, and they weren't cars, either. Coupé (some designers still insist on the "koo-pay" pronunciation) is the French verb meaning "to cut," and it was first applied to 19th Century carriages, where the rear-facing seats had been eliminated, or cut out.¹



So a closed car for two people would be called a "coupe" without the accent on the final "e". We now commonly pronounce the word "coop" as in "Little Deuce Coupe" by the Beach Boys.



Then there was the discussion about the name "Brougham" (pronounced "broom" or "brohm"). This was a light four-wheeled horse-drawn carriage built in the 19th century. Named for a Scottish jurist by the name of Lord Brougham, who had the first brougham built to his design by Robinson & Cook, London coachbuilders, in 1838 or 1839.

Three features were specific to the brougham: the sharply squared end of the roof at the back; the body line curving forward at the base of the enclosure; and a low entry into the enclosure, using a single step below the door.²

The 1922 Handbook retained the use of "roadster," while doing away with the name "runabout."

But my interest was in the renaming of the "Touring" car to a "Phaeton."

Apparently, the SAE felt that "Touring" actually applied to all types of automobiles, so its use as a body style was inexact. In addition, it was felt

that the older or original type was not suitable in general for use as an automobile body type. "This type of body is the logical successor of the family horse-drawn open carriage known as the phaeton."³ Above is an example of a horse-drawn phaeton.⁴

"Phaeton" was used in the earliest handbooks issued by the SAE. In the 1906 Handbook, Packard, Walters, Hudson and Stevens-Durvea all used the name; while Pierce-Arrow designated such a vehicle as a "tonneau". In Great Britain, the common term was "torpedo". By 1923, Packard, Franklin, Hudson, Cadillac, Stevens-Duryea, Cunningham, Pope-Hartford and Thomas all used "Phaeton".

Which brings me to my 1923 Gray Touring; an iconoclast even down to its name.

Years ago at Walt's Repair Day, your editor was given a suggested repair schedule by a member who had come across it and thought it might be of interest to Club members. PROPOSED MAY TOUR IN THE SHENANDOAH VALLEY.

I have volunteered to lead a Model A Club tour of Page County, Virginia, which lies just over the Blue Ridge from Sperryville. In partnership with fellow Page County resident Jim Cartmill, I plan to lead a driving tour of this lovely rural county, a sort of "land that time forgot." The proposed date for this one-day tour is Saturday May 18, which skirts both the Winchester Car Show on the 11th and Mother's Day on the 12th. The tour will involve driving on your own or in a group to Sperryville and crossing the Blue Ridge on Route 211 at that point. Jim and I will meet the cars by 10:00a.m. at an agreed spot on the west side of the mountain. Driving time from the Fairfax area would be about two hours. From 10:00 to 12:00, the tour will cover at a leisurely pace some of the lovely back roads of the county Railroad Club, of which Jim Cartmill is now president. We will lunch in downtown Luray's Uncle Buck's Restaurant. In the afternoon we plan a stop at Jon Phillips' Model A restoration shop (I haven't heard back from Jon yet) and at Cloudy Mountain Farm, where I can show off my car and truck collection along with working (yes, really working) farm tractors dating to 1955 and 1961. The tour will wrap up in the vicinity of 3:00 to 3:30 pm at Flotzie's Ice Cream Stand near the Luray Walmart. (see below)



Participants can then drive back to the DC area, or may opt to stay overnight in the area. The Mimslyn Inn and Skyland are good choices for lodgings. Please RSVP with interest by March 15. We'll go ahead with plans if at least five Club members make a commitment to come. -- Bill Shields
