




Sharon Leonard in her youth by the Leonard's 1930 Tudor sedan at the Pig Pickin'

Board of Directors Meeting March 27, 2019



Call to Order. The monthly meeting of the Board was called to order at about 7:10 pm by President Doug Tomb, in the meeting room at the Red, Hot and Blue Restaurant in Fairfax, Virginia.

Attendance. A quorum was present. Those Board members present were: Doug Tomb, Paul Bjarnason, James Kolody, Benny Leonard, Greg Shepherd, Milford Sprecher, Luke Chaplin, Bill Worsham, Jim Gray, Bill Sims, Jason Cunningham and Bruce Metcalf. Jamie Lucas was not present.

Minutes of Prior Meeting – Minutes of the prior meeting of the Board were published in *The Script*.

Agenda – Prior to the meeting, President Tomb circulated via e-mail an agenda that was followed during the meeting, as discussed below under each area of responsibility.

Budget – At the February 27, 2019 Board meeting a budget was adopted and presented at last week’s meeting of the general membership at which a discussion and suggestions were provided to the Board for consideration at tonight’s meeting. As a result the following resolutions were considered and adopted by the Board:

Be it resolved that our total charitable giving program will be increased from the amount originally approved at the Board’s February 20, 2019 meeting, which was \$1,750, to \$3,000, which is an increase of \$1,250. This increase will cover:

- 1 - one additional Sully scholarship for \$1,000, to make the scholarship total \$2,000. The \$2,000 will to cover one scholarship at \$1,000 and two at \$500; and
- 2 - \$250 additional to the Armed Forces Retirement Home (AFRH), to make the AFRH donation a total of \$500. We resolve to keep the MAFFI contribution at the reduced \$500 for this year. Therefore, the charitable giving program will total \$3,000 for 2019.

Be it resolved that we will propose to the membership a “50/50” for the April and May monthly meetings, prior to Sully, as a means to help fund the additional charitable giving just approved.

In connection with the latter resolution, Bill Sims agreed to take on at least one 50/50 project at an upcoming membership meeting.

Accordingly, the Club now has an approved operating budget for 2019.

Activities - Activities Chairman Jason Cunningham reported that several activities are in the planning stage. The Shenandoah and Luray tour needs a greater response from the membership in order to go forward. There probably will be no picnic immediately after Sully and possibly a picnic at Jim and Edna Cross's in the fall. A Cape May tour is being looked at, possibly including a cruise. The Warhurst picnic is still being planned.

Programs - Program Chairman Luke Chaplin reported that several meeting program slots still need to be filled, although the immediately upcoming meetings are taken care of. The April meeting will feature a program on touring planning by Doug Tomb and the May meeting will feature training for Sully judges to be led by Jim Gray and June will feature the Model T rescue led by Milford Sprecher.

Coverage for monthly meeting refreshments has been filled in and is set out by Greg Shepherd on the Club website. We agreed (without a formal vote) that each Board member would personally cover the cost of refreshments and that a "tin cup" would be put out for contributions from the membership. The thought is that with the voluntary tin cup contributions the out of pocket costs incurred by the individual Board member handling the refreshments for a meeting would be minimal.

Membership & Webmaster – Membership Chairman Greg Shepherd reported that during the month a few more dues payments came in and we now have 150 - 155 active paid members for 2019, which is slightly down from last year.

Sully Show Update – Jim Gray and Bill Worsham provided an update on Sully planning. Now, 26 out of 60 needed slots have been filled. Applications for cars are beginning to come in. Efforts are being made to arrange activities to encourage more traffic to the flea market area, for the benefit of the vendors. It is expected that things will greatly heat up in April.

Club Property Manager (Tools) – Property Manager Benny Leonard reported that there would be a small parts/social day in April or May, details TBA.

Youth Chairman (Scholarship) - Chairman James Kolody reminded everyone of the March 28 car show and downhill derby day, from 1:30 – 4:30 at Gunston Middle School. He expected 3 – 4 Model A's to show up.

Editor – Editor Bill Sims reported the deadline for the Script is April 1. As noted above, Bill volunteered to run a 50/50 at an upcoming membership meeting.

National Club Liaison - National Liaison Chairman Jamie Lucas was not present.

Adjournment

A motion was made and seconded and the meeting was adjourned at about 8:30 pm.

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LeBaron Bonney Company closes its doors

Last vestige of Amesbury's automotive history

AMESBURY — The last vestige of the city's automotive manufacturing history is no more after the LeBaron Bonney Company abruptly closed its doors and filed bankruptcy last week.

According to Kitaeff and Associates attorney Josh Burnett, the antique car upholstery company has filed for Chapter 7 bankruptcy. He said the company may no longer operate and a court-appointed trustee will liquidate and sell off its assets, either through private sales or at auction.

Founded by furniture makers Lee and Jack Atherton in 1938, LeBaron Bonney originally made bicycles but moved into the business of restoring the upholstery in old cars in 1959.

That business took off by the mid-1960s when the company moved from Haverhill to the old Biddle and Smart auto body factory on 6 Chestnut St.

The company operated into the 21st century but Trades Mill Co-op co-owner Barbara Lorenc bought its 49,937-square-foot headquarters for \$1.3 million last year.

Lorenc rented about 10,000 square feet to LeBaron Bonney after purchasing the building, but she said that all changed last Friday when the company's handful of remaining employees were suddenly let go.

Round Fender LLC owner and antique car appraiser Duncan LaBay said he was shocked to read about the bankruptcy in Hemmings Daily online Friday morning. "It's a sad day for the antique auto world," LaBay said. "It is also a sad day for the town of Amesbury because LeBaron Bonney is sort of the last of 100 years of coach building and related automotive activities."

Although most of the country's automotive manufacturing work moved to Detroit by the 1950s, but a good deal of antique automotive work ended up being done in the Northeast, according to LaBay.


“You have Hampton Coach in downtown Hampton, which was purchased by LeBaron Bonney,” LaBay said. “If you look at the hobby, nationally, the Hampton Coach and LeBaron Bonney names are the gold standard, in terms of the correct interiors with the original patterns. I think all of the patterns and materials that they had were one of the firm’s biggest assets. I have no doubt that somebody will acquire those and it will continue on in some fashion. Just not in Massachusetts.”

According to LaBay, the antique automotive business has mostly become “an online venture” in the 21st century.

“A lot of companies are struggling to figure out how to do online commerce,” he said. “They are still sort of in the mail order catalog business. That is a struggle that a lot of firms and organizations generally look at when they transition from the purchase and order world to online sales.”


LaBay, who is also an assistant professor with the Economics and Business Department at Saint Anselm College, said a Chapter 7 bankruptcy is the final word for a company.

“This is a Chapter 7, not a Chapter 11,” LaBay said. “A Chapter 11 bankruptcy is a reorganization, ‘let’s give us some relief from debt band right the ship.’ A Chapter 7 is a white flag and ‘we’re done.’ So what I am hearing about last Friday would fit very much within that.”



SIGN UP FOR MAY TOUR IN THE SHENANDOAH VALLEY

I have volunteered to lead a Model A Club tour of Page County, Virginia, which lies just over the Blue Ridge from Sperryville. In partnership with fellow Page County resident Jim Cartmill, I plan to lead a driving tour of this lovely rural county, a sort of "land that time forgot." The date for this one-day tour is Saturday, May 18, which skirts both the Winchester Car Show on the 11th and Mother's Day on the 12th. The tour will involve driving on your own or in a group to Sperryville and crossing the Blue Ridge on Route 211 at that point. Jim and I will meet the cars by 10:00a.m. at an agreed spot on the west side of the mountain. Driving time from the Fairfax area would be about two hours. Lodging Update
