

Board Meeting January 4, 2020



Call to Order. The transition meeting of the Board was called to order at about 7:00 pm by President Doug Tomb, at Mylo's Grill in McLean, Virginia, and adjourned at about 7:30 pm.

Jim Gray and Jamie Lucas were not present.

Minutes of Prior Meeting – Minutes of the prior Board meeting were published in *The Script*.

Board Meeting Agenda – President Tomb started the Board meeting stating our agenda would be limited to introduction of the new Board members and recognition of the e-mail approval by the Board for the cost of the transition Board dinner, which approximates \$700. Since the last meeting of the Board, no other votes were taken, including at the transition Board meeting.

He said he resolved to start doing more work on his car in 1995, and that it certainly wouldn't be hard to beat his record for 1994 - -saying "some work is better than none at all".



He thanked Lloyd and Sandy Hoffman for the work they did setting up the Christmas party. John Kandl got kudos too for making the center pieces for the tables, which everyone enjoyed. Walt Bratton was given thanks for donating gift certificates for the drawing, Mary Duncan for sweaters she embroidered and thanks too to his wife Carol, who helped with the stained-glass sun catchers.

At the party John Howell was presented with a certificate of appreciation for his financial advice and auditing, helping to ensure that the Club remained financially secure. Andy Pogan was given the Carl Patrick Memorial Award for continuing service to the membership. He also volunteered to monitor the two organizations lobbying Federal legislation dealing with "clunkers" and to report back to the board periodically.

At the Board meeting, Kirsten Gottschalk, visiting from Denmark, told about the club there, and said the principal difference was that her club owned its own meeting house. Kirsten is better known today as Mrs. Brad Minners. Do Model A's have a way of drawing people together or what.... And does anyone (you gotta be an old timer) remember the dead-ended discussions in our chapter about getting our own place?

MAFCA bestowed a runner-up award for our Script. Editor Bill modestly said it won because he was just trying to live up to the standards of his predecessors.

Howard Minners wrote a long informative article about Model A rims. Did you know there were three different manufacturers? That all wheels were painted black until July 1930? That there are 30 1/4" diameter steel spokes in each wheel, 20 short ones and 10 long, with a tensile strength of 4,000 pounds? That they were different from other wire wheels of the era because the spokes were electrically welded to both the hub and the rim? And that while they all look alike, there are 4 variations in the spacing of spokes? And some thought it was just an ordinary wheel!




GWC CHRISTMAS PARTY – DECEMBER 7, 2019

Secretary of War? His past ownership is memorialized by the name of the restaurant then in the building, the Taft House Inn. Today, this area of K Street north of the White House little resembles its prior self. The former Taft House and adjacent buildings seen on the previous page are long gone to “progress.”

There is a second photo of the car and the surrounding group taken by photographer John Farrell. The photos on Shorpy.com are high definition and it is fun to read the inscriptions on the car and the business signs on the building. It is also fun to look at the people up close and wonder about who they were and how the growing World War impacted their lives.



The title of the photo says it's a student's car in front of University Club on K Street NW. It is ironic that they considered this Model A Ford an old car in 1942, when it was only 13 or 14 years old. Automobile style and technology had certainly changed a lot in those years. Lots of cars from 2006 and 2007 (and much older!) are still on the road and don't stand out as being old.

If 1603 is indeed the address, then all of this has been replaced with modern buildings, and there's a Kia parked in their spot.
