

## REPORT FROM THE BOARD ZOOM TELECONFERENCE

Minutes of Board Meeting Sept 28, 2022

The meeting was called to order by the Vice President, Milford Sprecher at 7 PM. There was not a quorum. Attendees were Milford Sprecher, Bill Sims, Paul Bjarnasan, John Dougherty and Greg Shepherd. Luke Chaplin joined briefly, but could not log on to Zoom and dropped off the phone.



Milford will continue to serve as refreshment chair for the time being.

The first item of discussion was the club picnic. John Leydon offered the use of his place in Aldie. Another option was to drive to Willowcroft Winery. Greg will send out an e-mail asking for input as to which option is the preferred one and a date, likely the weekend of October 22.

There was a brief report on the strategic planning meeting. The draft survey prepared by Gene Rainville was trimmed a bit to make it more likely for members to complete.

The American Legion noticed the Treasurer that the Legion Hall would not be available for the club meeting in November due to renovations of the hall. It was agreed that the meeting would be held through Zoom.

The nominations committee is working. Two positions have been filled. The role of President has yet to be filled. The next meeting of the committee is tomorrow night (Sept. 29).

John Dougherty is looking to have the Letter of Agreement with parks department for Sully approved by November so we can proceed with the planning. He will also send a note out to the Sully committee to see if members will continue to serve in their capacity.

No program has been set for October. Milford has tried to contact the person in Hagerstown who had the speedster who had offered to talk to the club about building his car has not responded. He was also in contact with the McLean Fire Dept about a fire extinguisher demonstration. He has not heard back from them, either. Paul mentioned a CPR demonstration in conjunction with that, but without any contact from the fire department, we cannot schedule that, either. I have had my antique car insurance through J. C. Taylor since I bought my first Model A. I have been happy with the rate and service, such as it was as I had not had a claim. I had thought about getting comparison quotes from other insurers, but had not done so. When, after hearing the insurance talk by Bill Simons, I added my cars to my umbrella policy, my current agent for the umbrella policy asked if they could give me a quote from Hagerty, I decided to get a quote from them. I was aware that Hagerty is giving a discount to MARC members and I asked if I could get that discount through my current agent? I was told that I could. The upshot is that I am saving at least 25% on my premiums through Hagerty, with one additional car. I had not had my Model T on my Hagerty policy because it was not on the road. That was another recommendation from Bill Simons, so I am insuring more cars for at least 25% less. Not bad.

In addition to the highlights above there were several cars that stood out over the 100 or so cars present (photo left).


The Edgar Rohr family registered their - Buick Model 36 Roadster. and Sean brought his Griffin Worx

## HENRY FORD AND RICHMOND HILL, GA

The Club was privileged to have a fascinating presentation by Dave Gunnarson about Henry Ford's Richmond Hill, GA, estate at the September meeting. Dave had made the same presentation to the Northern Virginia Regional Group of the Early Ford V8 Club and subsequently published an article based on his research in the V8 Times.

Henry Ford was one of the most famous people in the world after the success of the Model T. He also had the need to get away from Dearborn and at Thomas Edison's suggestion, purchased property in Fort Myers, FL in 1916. He could be near his friend and mentor Edison, but there wasn't much else in Fort Myers at the time and when he and Edison arrived, there were often many on-lookers who had heart about the visit by the famous men.



Taking the train to Ft. Myers, Ford passed through Georgia and was impressed with the Georgia landscape. When visiting the Ogeechee River by yacht with his friend the naturalist John Burroughs, Ford decided to build a winter home there.



Beginning in 1925, Henry Ford started buying land in the area and eventually bought over 85,000 acres! Construction of the house began in 1936 and was completed in 1937 (photo left). They named the house Richmond Hill from the name of the original plantation in the area. Ford rebuilt and old rice mill into a power house with a workshop overhead for him to tinker in.

Ford was never one not to try and make improvements in anything he was associated with and the Richmond Hill area saw significant impact from Ford's presence there. He hired many local people and began looking after their

needs. He underwrote a health clinic to try and eradicate typhoid fever, smallpox, diphtheria, hookworm and venereal disease. He built a commissary and bakery, a community house, schools (equal facilities for both whites and blacks) housing for his workers, and a fire and rescue station. He also restarted industries, including a lumber mill and instituted a regenerative forestry program.

After determining that the land was not good for growing soybeans or rubber plants that he could use in his industrial activities, experimentation determined that the land was good for growing lettuce, so he established iceberg lettuce farms as a cash crop for his acreage.

At the end of his life, Henry Ford had invested over \$4M for the Richmond Hill properties, which appraised at \$3M. He spent over \$3.5M for operations and contributed \$500K for education. He employed over 800 people in his activities there.

After Henry and Clara Ford's deaths, the Ford era at Richmond Hill ended. The house went through several owners and eventually was used to store hay. It has recently been restored as a part of a private community.

Today Richmond Hill is a tourist destination located right off I-95 south of Savannah. For more information, refer to the articles in the May/June and July/August issues of the V8 Times. Please put 140 Rock Creek Church Road, NW Washington, DC into your navigation app or GPS. That will take you to Eagle Gate. That is the only gate open at this time. If you simply put in Armed Forces Retirement Home, you sometimes get directed to another gate, and these are not open on the weekends.

When you arrive at the gate, the driver will have to show an ID, and every passenger over 18 will have to show a photo ID to enter. If you have your vaccine card, and can show you are fully vaccinated, you will not need to wear a face mask while outside at the show. If you do not have the card, or are not vaccinated, you will still need to wear a mask and keep six or more feet from our residents even though the show is outside.

As they did last year, the cars will be staged between the Scott and Sheridan Buildings, and on Rose Chapel Circle. This is much closer to the residences, and more convenient for residents to come see the show. Please follow the signs to the staging area.

In the past, they have offered winners' trophies. This year they would like to invite you to come and talk with the residents, show off your beautiful automobiles; and everyone will receive a challenge coin with the AFRH logo on one side and thank you on the other. This year we want to just enjoy the program.


