REPORT FROM THE BOARD ZOOM TELECONFERENCE

Minutes of Board Meeting October 26, 2022

President Milford Sprecher opened the October board meeting, held in person at the Red, Hot & Blue restaurant, at 7:05 PM. In addition to Milford, those present were Paul Bjarnason, John Dougherty, James Kolody, Gene Rainville, Greg Shepherd, Bill Sims, and Doug Tomb. Absent were Luke Chaplin, Edna Cross, Stan Johnson, Benny Leonard, and Bruce Metcalf. A quorum was present for the meeting.

Milford opened the meeting by thanking John Leydon, Bruce Metcalf and Gene Rainville for their efforts to make the Oak Hill Picnic such a success. Milford noted the excellent turnout of Model A Fords, as well as other interesting cars. The picnic was a huge success and was appreciated by all in attendance. Milford also had a special Thank You for John Leydon, our host at the Oak Hill picnic.

Paul Bjarnason next gave the Treasurer's Report, stating that the current balance in the Club checking account is \$38,233.23. Paul noted that the Board will need to appoint an auditor to perform the annual audit of the Club books at the beginning of the new year.

Gene Rainville next gave the Activity Report, reminding us that the Armed Forces Retirement Home Car Show will be held on Sunday, November 6th. The Club Christmas Party will be on Saturday, December 3rd, and the Club Brown Bag Gift Exchange Meeting, will be held on Wednesday, December 21st, at the Balls Hill Road Post 270 Hall. For the new year 2023, Gene will be using a new format for the Activity Calendar, and is looking for feedback on it.

Milford next asked for a report from the Club Nominating Committee, and Greg reported that all positions have been filled, except for Assistant Treasurer. There are several candidates that they still expect to hear back from. Once the slate is complete, it will be sent out to the membership, and voting will be held remotely by email, as well as at the November Monthly Meeting in person. Milford announced that pie and ice cream will be provided by the Club at the meeting.

Next, Milford mentioned that the November Monthly Meeting presentation would be given by Nick Arrington, with the topic, "Pointers on How to Successfully Sell an Antique Car".

John Dougherty reported that plans are already in the works for Sully 48 in 2023. John is in discussion with the Sully staff about plans for next year. Additional volunteers will be needed for judging, parking, and the field set-up. John reported that the weather will be partly cloudy, temperature in the low 70's, with a light breeze from the northwest.

There was discussion about combining Small Parts Day and Sand Blast Day next spring. Further planning is needed, and a suitable location will have to be decided in the new year.

A motion was then presented: "To investigate a suitable memorial recognition, in memory of Bill Worsham, by the Club". This was seconded, and was passed by unanimous vote of the Board members present. Milford will appoint a committee to report their findings to the Board at a future meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 PM.

Usually buying a completed car is cheaper than the cost of a total restoration." He said to look around at the people who have bought running cars or have had professionals work on them and see how much fun they are having driving them. After a discussion about winter storage, he concluded his President's Desk narrative saying that the most fun way to store your car for the winter is not to put it away at all and to get it out and drive it occasionally.

GWC Survey



MAFFI NEWSLETTER MINUTE

As you will have read in the MARC <u>Model A News</u> and the MAFCA <u>Restorer</u> magazines by now the Model A Museum celebrated its 10th anniversary at Model A Days on September 16-17 on the Gilmore campus near Hickory Corners, MI. Those same magazines will have published the MAFFI Hall of Fame (HOF) inductees for the 2022 year. You, however, will probably not read any of the inductee's acceptance speeches.

Howard Minners became the first person to make his HOF acceptance speech live at the MAFFI Annual Membership Meeting, using "ZOOM" and seen on a big screen television. Below are excerpts from his remarks that history buffs of the Model A hobby will find interesting:

"Two milestone events stand out and I'll make them very brief. Once MAFFI decided to establish a museum, two issues became an immediate focus.

"The first was the obvious question of where the museum would be located. I ended up spending time with other Board members, personally visiting a number of possible sites. Among them the AACA Museum in Hershey, the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, the Petersen in California, the Gilmore, of course, here in Michigan and the Early V-8 Museum outside of Auburn, Indiana. The latter had been a prime consideration. But MAFFI Board members subsequently visited the Gilmore and agreed this is where we wanted to be.

Thereafter, the question arose, what should our museum look like. I, along with Loukie Smith and Stan Johnson, came together and brought along pictures of various Ford dealerships from the Model A Ford era. By chance, I brought along a May 1929 article ... from a magazine called *Ford Dealer and Service Seal*. This was a private magazine for dealers and edited by Mary Bronstein. (Page 40) showed a front face view of a suggested medium size Ford dealership building. That drawing eventually won the day, and that is what you now see as the facade of our MAFFI Museum here at the Gilmore."

You now know, "the rest of the story".

Howard A. Minners Inducted 2022

Howard grew a deep historical interest in the development and era surrounding the Ford Model A. The introduction and advertising campaign for the New Ford caught Howard's attention, inspiring him to collect original era Ford advertisements and sales brochures from all over the world. His extensive international collection of Model A advertisements and sales brochures is now among the largest in the world. To share his knowledge, Howard formed the "Model A Ad Collectors Region" of the Model A Restorers Club (MARC) and the "Model A Ad Collectors Chapter" of the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA) and published his quarterly newsletter, *Model A Ad Collectors*.

HOWARD MINNERS INDUCTED INTO MODEL A FORD HALL OF FAME (Cont.)

He and his wife Gretchen's meticulous restoration of their 1930 Cabriolet resulted in awards of a MARC of Excellence, a MAFCA Award of Excellence, as well as a Henry Award. Howard became a Master Model A Judge with an area of expertise in upholstery. Howard and his wife spent years researching and documenting the correct original upholstery for the Ford Model A. To share with fellow collectors what he had learned, he joined what would become The Model A Ford Foundation, Inc. (MAFFI) Upholstery Project. Howard and his wife spearheaded the Upholstery Project's research by collecting original upholstery samples from members of the Model A community and, so that all members could benefit from his research, he and his team compiled the material in binders containing samples of both original upholstery material and replacement material. One of those binders is now available for research at the Model A Ford Museum in The Gilmore Car Museum, Hickory Corners, Michigan, with the other two distributed to the two national Model A clubs.

In 1995, Howard became the President of MAFFI and, during two terms as president, he led The Foundation through a period of significant growth. Under his leadership and guidance, Howard organized a team of volunteers over several years to document and index the thousands of mechanical engineering drawings, which are stored in boxes in the bowels of the Benson Ford

Research Center of the Henry Ford. Because of this new, organized access to the original Ford parts drawings, reproduction parts manufacturers now are able to make more accurate replacement parts for our Model A's.

In 2009, when MAFFI was looking for a location for its new museum, Howard led the search for its new museum site. One year later, a memorandum of understanding was signed with The Gilmore Car Museum. At the time, Howard was also a member of the museum building selection committee. It was through his research in his personal Ford literature archives that he proposed what would later be selected as the general design of The Model A Museum building. Howard has been a long and dedicated Trustee of MAFFI and remains an active member of the MAFFI Investment Committee, insuring that the memberships' funds continue to grow and will be able to sustain the Museum's operations in perpetuity.

Howard has always had a strong connection to the Model A hobby. Early in his service to his local Model A club (the George Washington Chapter / Mount Vernon Region) Howard was entrusted to be the club's newsletter editor. Here, he transformed it into a valuable, relevant and focused publication which ultimately was awarded the coveted MARC Best Newsletter Award. He also served on the local club Board of Directors as well as the National Liaison to both National Model A clubs.

Howard was not only an active leader in his local club, and MAFFI, but he also passionately contributed to both MAFCA) and MARC and served for four years as National Secretary of MARC. While not busy judging cars, or hosting seminars at annual Model A National or Membership Meets, Howard could usually be found playing the piano, or ukulele, as background music for the era fashion shows or awards banquets. For his lifetime achievements, extraordinary service and significant contributions to the Model A hobby, in 2001 he was awarded MARC's highest honor: The Ken Brady Award.

With his significant contributions to the Model A community, Howard is most deserving of a place of honor in the Model A Ford Hall of Fame.



William Kenneth (Bill) Worsham passed away peacefully on October 10, 2022, after a long and courageous battle with Parkinson's disease. Bill was born on July 21, 1939, at Georgetown hospital in Washington, DC, to John and Anna Marie Worsham. He is survived by his wife of 60 years, Judy Worsham, his son Kenneth Worsham and his wife Christine, and his grandchildren Meghan and Nathan.

Bill grew up in Washington, DC, and Arlington, Virginia. After graduating from Annandale High School, he joined the National Guard, where he was a radar operator at the Lorton, Virginia, Nike missile site. During this time, he was recruited to become a State Farm insurance agent. He worked hard and he grew his agency into a very successful insurance business. He retired in 2017 after 52 years. Bill made many lifetime friendships at State Farm and helped many get started in the insurance business.

Bill's life-long passion was antique cars and he loved his 1930 Model A Town Sedan. He was a member of the George Washington Chapter of the Model A Ford Club for over 50 years. Cooking on the manifold That tuna was gold


Time to retard that spark Get movin' before dark

MY EXPERIENCE WITH MODEL A FORDS

(This excerpt is from an article written some time ago and used in our 50th Anniversary issue celebrating the Club's founding by Joe Thoma. It will be republished in its entirety next year when the Club celebrates its 60th anniversary.)

In a short while our Club membership and activity began to grow. Eager in my new role, I suggested we should consider holding an antique auto show and maybe even have a small flea market with it. That comment evoked a bit of laughter among the Club officer's as they choked and spilled some of their beer. Really! This was followed by some good-natured joshing as they told me of previous unsuccessful attempts to organize such an ambitious event. I respected their comments, but I couldn't abandon the thought; I was convinced the potential was near.

Somewhere in this timeframe I got a call from a relatively new member I had brought into the Club by the name of Bill Worsham. He said "they" were having a meeting to solicit nominations for a club president for 1974 and would I be interested? I chuckled a bit, said no because I didn't know anything about a Model A Ford and wouldn't know how to perform as president. Undaunted, he persisted until I agreed to think about it partly just to get him off the phone and give me time to think of how to gracefully decline. When I asked how long I had to think this over he said, "Oh, about 30 minutes." I shortly returned his call and said I would oblige if I could have Bill Worsham as my Vice President and an agreement to formally change the by-laws to delete the limited Club membership clause. (The existing by-laws limited membership to 17 people and we were already well over that number. I also felt we would need more people for the antique auto show I would now plan). I learned later that I had already been "drafted" as the Club president for 1974 and my acceptance as a nominee had merely confirmed my fate.

After 1974, I served on the Board of Directors for 5 years. Bill Worsham became the 1975 Club President, and he was as busy then as he is today in always promoting an improved car show for the next year. It was largely through his own perseverance that the Club secured Sully Plantation for our 1976 show. The Club had to have more money to hold this show and bought a 1929 Model A Tudor from Al Heine to raffle off. Bill asked me to chair the car raffle and although I forget our net gain, it was sufficient to provide the Club with enough money to pay off our first Sully show expenses. The raffle car was won by fellow Club member Alfred Black, who still owns and drives it.

HERSHEY 2022 - IN SEARCH OF A PLUG

I had several targets for Hershey this year, each related to the ongoing refreshing of my 1923 Gray Touring. One of those was a 2 3/4" tall Champion 6 spark plug.

The president of the Gray Manufacturing Corporation was Frank Klingensmith, the former #3 at

Ford – so it's little wonder that my Gray bears a strong resemblance to the Model T.




But the car – and especially the engine -- was very different. Derived from the design for marine motors, my engine is a low-, rather than a high-, compression motor. This required a high-temperature spark plug to prevent fouling. Gray used the Champion 6. There were very few low-compression engines, and therefor very little demand for this hot Champion 6 plug. But it worked very well in the Grav.

MANAGEMENT TO STATE STATE

When coupled with the Scoe variable venturi carburetor, a 1922 Gray Touring (nearly identical in appearance to my 1923) set a AAA certified "...world's economy record of 33.8 miles per gallon of gasoline from San Francisco to New York" on October 10, 1922, as reported on page 39 of The Detroit Free Press on October 22, 1922.

So where could I go to find this special plug? Why Hershey, of course; a source of many, many rare and mysterious items over my 20+ years of its 67-year history, and I hoped it










working Scoe Carburetor.

Needles in a huge haystack. I felt good about finding a plug, but much less sure of finding the gear or the carburetor.

And then this \$12,000 "teens" T fitted with a York-built Martin body and a '31 A sport coupe.





There were a few wonders in the car corral like this Pierce-Arrow, "America's Finest Built Motor Car". Already sold when I saw it Wednesday, it was a great beauty.
