In addition, Milford brought various items from Tom Terko's estate for sale. The compression tester, 2-bladed aluminum fan and a set of brake shoes went quickly. Luke Chaplin showed his Chevy S-10 Borg Warner 5-speed transmission, which he plans to install in his AA Truck build. The S-10 is ideal because of the placement of the shift lever closely matches an A. Transmission Exchange in Monticello, KY, makes an adapter plate (606-348-8533). Because it is being installed in an AA, no modification is needed to the torque tube.

Don White showed his Logo light kit, including the fuse panel and lights he is planning to install on his Woody.

The meeting adjourned at 9:35 with lots of follow-on discussions.

THE GEORGE WASINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO

Just as now, the May meeting was the last before Sully, so the narrative follows closely with that of previous years. Annual Meet Chairman Bill Worsham reported the meet was on track, but more volunteers were needed in all areas, a sign-up sheet would be at the next meeting. The proceeds from the event cover the expense of almost all of our activities. Members who could not attend were told they could call a committee chairman to sign up. Bill said that a special '50's display would cover the founding of the park, a post office facility would be set up to

handle the stamping of a commemorative first-issue stamp, and the 2001 Thunderbird would be on display.

On the Ford Script cover, a picture of Bill appeared with the caption: Bill Worsham, the hero of Sully. Chuck Manns, writing in his From the President's Desk column, said that one of the objectives he established at the onset was to enhance our technical programs, since the aim and purpose of our Club is to maintain and drive our Model A's. Under the leadership role taken by Vice President and Program Chairman Stan Johnson, to date there had been three excellent technical programs.

Stan reported the May program would be about wheels in coordination with the upcoming wheel straightening and blasting day to be hosted by John Kandl. He said such questions as how many types of Model A wheels there were, how do you know if the wheel you're considering at a flea market is a good one, and how do you repair and refinish a wheel would be addressed. A contest was announced to see who could bring the WORST wheel. Luke Chaplin won, then offered his wheel to anyone for 25 cents. No takers.

Some of the things that occurred 25 years ago were the traditional pancake breakfast, a visit to the Flying Circus, and the Trolley Museum. Richard Dove, Jerry Snyder and F. Von Ferguson, who was in charge of the White House cars, joined the Club and, get this, Bill Condon gave a tip that a Falls Church paint supplier would mix Model A paint colors for \$18 to \$30 a gallon depending on color, in lacquer that is! Those were the days...

In another contest, awards would be made to the member who drove an A to the most Club functions and another to the member logging the most miles in attending Club functions, which were defined as those of the GWC only. So long for now.



NEW IN NOVA: FORD'S GARAGE MOVING INTO NORTHERN VIRGINIA

(An update of the article that appeared in the Feb. 2024 Script, p. 18)



The Florida-based Ford's Garage restaurant chain has announced that they are moving into the Northern Virginia market.

The company has signed a new local franchisee for a three-store deal – meaning the intention is to open at least that many locations, perhaps more.

The announcement says the current areas they are focusing on include Alexandria, Fairfax and Woodbridge, although other communities could be in play as well. No official sites have been announced yet.

If you're not familiar, Ford's Garage got its start in 2012 in Fort Myers, Florida — where Henry Ford had a winter residence. Today, there are 30 locations across eight states, according to the company. There is one location here in Virginia, in the Richmond area.

Ford's aims to transport diners to a 1920's garage and "blends an expansive menu of American comfort food and vintage automotive nostalgia," the announcement reads.

"With a menu that features their famous burgers, wings and a tower of onion rings, comfort foods, and irresistible desserts, there is truly an option to fit everyone's preferences," it continues. "As the only restaurant brand with an official Ford licensing agreement, Ford's Garage stands out in its design, with cars hanging from the ceiling and vintage-style décor, paying homage to classic car culture while still delivering a family-friendly dining experience."

MORE INFO FOR THOSE ATTENDING THE MODEL A EVENT AT OAK HILL

The following information is for those who have registered for the Model 'A' event at Oak Hill Farm on Sunday, May 18. Here are a few preliminaries you might want to know about the weekend and day of the party:

Saturday (5/17):

For GBMAFC and others, this is a three-day excursion. For GWC it's a day trip. SULLY 50 MAGIC

Sully 50 is coming up—and our prep work is going well. As I walked the field with the Sully staff on April 18, we located tents and fence lines and learned about the County 20-foot setback from historic structures requirement for tents, cars and displays. This will affect the location of the band, which will move to the south of the stone building on the top of the rise, where they will be shaded by a tent. This setback will also affect where we park cars in the vicinity of the graveyard, gardens, and throughout the entire Sully area. We do, however, have permission for the Sno Cone booth on the patio on the east side of the School House, and we will still have a volunteer break room in the cellar of the mansion.

One of the biggest changes on the field is the loss of the last big shade tree on the south lawn. We will replace that lost shade with a large tent, set at a right angle to our trophy and awards tent. Turning to the left of the old shade tree stumps, our formerly shady Model A lawn is now largely an open field. Part of that field will have a children's activity tent and a misting tent on it as we had last year.



The information booth tent will be relocated to its location in previous years on the north west side of the mansion. We got permission to park the Model T Paddy wagon – which is now confirmed - next to it, since that will place it right at 20 feet from the mansion. The registration tent will be where we had it last year; the large tent that was to its southeast last year will not be there this year. The judge's tent will, as it was last year, be to the west of the registration tent.

Our trailer-mounted ATM has been confirmed, and will be parked in the Car Corral area near the food court.

The Take-apart-T is confirmed and will be in the same place as last year.

Bruce Metcalf sent out our flea market registration information, but we seem to be behind on vendors. BUT... we're working on getting a Taco Truck on the west side of the flea market, so that'll be fun. We'll continue recruiting vendors at the Luray Mid-Atlantic show.

We judged 190 cars last year, and we expect more this year. We aim to keep the cars per judge to 10 or less. If we get to 200 cars, then 20 judges should be enough – sign up to judge with us!!

We got the good news that Butch Yowell and Dave Frederick will both be supporting us with their hit-or-miss engine display. They will have the same big tent arrangement as last year. With our lean staff, we won't display our compressor this year.

Also missing this year will be Mike Copperthite's 1914 Model T pie truck, which is on loan to the Model T Ford Museum in Richmond, IN.

Gil Beckner has procured our dash plaques. He has also received our trophies, sponsored by Black Wolf Automotive Classic Car Restoration (https://blackwolfauto.com/) again this year. The Tom Terko pins are scheduled to arrive on Friday, May 9.

We have a lot of interest in our special Model A Ford Hot Rod Class from potential judges and others just interested in seeing what shows up.

Donna Stubin has done a great job working publicity for Sully 50 and coordinating with our remote web master, Greg Shepherd, to get our registration form and other Sully associated documents posted on our web site.

Bill and Carol Benedict have sent out our registration forms, and tell me they have 40 cars registered as of May 6. They will be with me at the May 21 meeting to continue to work registrations. I'll give a brief tutorial on appearance judging at the beginning of the meeting while we still have good light.

The magic of Sully is assembling all these bits into a family-friendly Father's Day show that entertains thousands of visitors every year. A multi-faceted display of creative and competitive spirit. From farm engines to vintage and antique cars to hot rods, Sully is a celebration of ingenuity.
