



Board Meeting May 28, 2025



President Milford Sprecher called the GWC board meeting to order at 7:05 PM. Board members in attendance: Milford Sprecher, Don White, Doug Tomb, Bill Sims, Valerie Faircloth, Jim Gray, Blane Adcock, Bruce Metcalf, and Dave Greenwood.

Sully update: Jim said we have about 110 cars registered so far and 15 flea market vendors. The county will open the park gates on Friday for set up at 6:00 AM and on Sunday for the show. Trailer parking begins at 7:30 on show day. Generally, Jim feels we have sufficient volunteers, but more are always welcome. Jim will ask Chris Berry of Black Wolf Automotive Specialties to present the trophy for Best of Show; they have been sponsoring the trophies. This year we will call up trophy winners by class to shorten the time it takes. John Dougherty will pick up the coloring books for the children's tent, Valerie will be delivering 17 cases of water for the snow cones. Milford has authorized a social media advertisement on Face Book to help draw more to the show.

We want to send out a warning to members and volunteers that the tick population at the park is significant. Although the grass will be cut, make sure to use insect repellant.

In the Model A parking area, the large shade tree has been removed so the park and GWC will be providing a large tent to help keep members and guests in the shade.

Our food vendor has notified us that this will be his last year and that he will introduce us to a new vendor for future events.

Treasurer: Doug will provide an update in the Script once he gets the end-of-month statement and checks deposited.

Activities: Post Sully picnic: Val is planning for the picnic and will try first for June 28 with an alternate date of July 12.

Programs: Our July 16 general meeting will be an indoor and outdoor flea market at our regular monthly meeting site, the Mclean American Legion Hall.

Script: The articles are due to Bill on Monday June 2.

General discussion: The Board authorized formal thank-you recognition to John Leydon for leading and hosting the Oak Hill event on May 18. The board also requested the Treasurer to send our previously approved budget sponsorship check of \$800, in addition to the registration fee amounts to John.

Club tools: Milford will discuss with Benny about moving the Club tools this summer. The board also discussed that we no longer use the Smith Compressor and will consider options to sell or

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 50 YEARS AGO

LOOKING BACK—GWC MEETING JUNE 1975

The June 11, 1975, meeting at the Springfield Legion Hall featured a talk by Dave Westenberger, who had just officiated as chief judge at the Jerry's Ford show held the month before. He shared some observations on judging Model A's to help members learn of improvements they could make to upgrade their cars.

A caravan to the Andy Jaeger Pancake Breakfast was planned, to leave from the regular meeting place in Springfield. What a great service Andy has provided to the membership for all of these years! Oops—Ellen too, of course.

The newsletter (it hadn't yet been named The Ford Script) announced the formation of a tool exchange and asked members to identify specialty tools they would lend (or rent). A Cardex file system was to be established that would be available at all meetings for members' perusal. From a humble beginning, our tool collection has become a valuable asset to GWCers in need of that special serewhatchet for fixing the womsat that just can't be tweaked with almost any other thingamajig.

The Club was growing rapidly. One of our greatest early promoters, Joe Thoma, could spot Model A's inside locked garages with no windows and also had an uncanny ability to whammy any owner who hadn't yet joined GWC to just pony up and do so. This month, the fruits of his work were apparent as no less than NINE new members were announced, including Jerry DeWitt!

CARS NEEDED FOR 4TH OF JULY PARADE


Below is some information about participating in the Takoma Park 4th of July parade as a dignitary driver. Please let me know what additional questions you have or information it would be helpful to have. Tara Marie Egan tara.marie.egan@gmail.com

- We're seeking owners of classic or otherwise unique or special vehicles to drive dignitaries in Takoma Park's 2025 Independence Day Parade
- The parade takes place on Friday, July 4. It begins at 10am and runs until around 11:30am. Dignitaries and dignitary drivers are placed in the first division of the parade, so can expect to have completed the parade by no later than 11am. You can find a map of the parade route here.
- Drivers assemble in the Takoma Junction parking lot (next to the Takoma Park Silver Spring Co-Op at 201 Ethan Allen Ave, Takoma Park, MD)
- Drivers will be matched with a dignitary (and their family members, if applicable), based on their vehicle's passenger capacity. Dignitaries in the parade are local elected officials and other community leaders (such as the principals of local schools).
- Drivers would be asked to attach foam signs prepared by the parade committee with the dignitary's name and title to their vehicle. (Signs are attached with string to ensure that they don't damage the vehicles.)
- Drivers are acknowledged on our website, in the printed program for the parade, and by the parade announcer when you pass the reviewing stand. Drivers are also provided with a \$20 stipend to support gas costs.

Classic and other special vehicles are a vital part of Takoma Park's annual celebration. It would be just wonderful if you could share this need in your club newsletter. Please let me know if there are questions I can answer or anything I can do to help.

SULLY 50 – EVERYTHING, EVERYWHERE, ALL AT ONCE

Setting up Sully 50 begins on Friday, June13. The gates will open at 6 a.m., and Dave Greenwood, Michael DiBeraradino, Wayne Parker, Roger Thiel and Dave Waggy will begin laying out the show. With 164 entrants already signed up, we expect nearly 300 by show time. That includes hit or miss engines, some military vehicles, an award-winning 2016 Shelby Mustang and a 1924 Model T Paddy Wagon. And of course, show cars. We plan on Rusty and Greg "Wojo" Wojtkun to lay out the Flea Market with the traditional 10-foot long bamboo poles to locate the vendor's booths. This would be a great place to sell your excess treasures Bruce Metcalf says we still have lots of room available.

The Sully staff will have put up our boundary orange "snow fence" and tents. Now that the last shade tree on the Model A lawn has been cut down, we'll see a 20" X 30' shade tent in its place, with an excellent view of the Awards Tent. Along the entrance road, we'll see the Information Booth tent – close to the trees – and a space 20' from the house for the Paddy Wagon. We'll see a Fairfax County Parks tent and a misting tent on the south side of the Model A Lawn. On the western border of the lawn, we'll see the set-up area for the band, and on the west side of the stone building – where the band used to be - we'll see the Children's tent.

After the lines are drawn on the show car field, we'll mark the parking area of each of the 31 classes, based upon the data we've collected by Bill & Carol Benedict, the Registration Gurus.

Sunday begins again at 6 a.m. with Larry Faircloth delivering 17 cases of water for Jason and Loriel's Sno Cone Booth – assisted by former Sno Cone leaders, Greg and Laura Shepherd. We'll see the ATM trailer and car carrying trailers being parked. By 7:30, Butch Card and Dave Frederick (the 2 Hit or Miss engine masters) will have arrived and begun setting up their soon-to-be chugging engines. James Kolody and Luke Chaplin will offer assistance if required. Registration for show cars will have also begun. After the cars get their entry materials, legions of old car parkers will guide the cars to their assigned class parking areas.

Our 30+judges will meet at the judging tent at 10:00 for a 15-minute information session conducted by co-chief judges Jaime Gray Nelson and Jeff VanGorder. After handing out the judging badges and clip boards with attached paperwork, the clock begins to tick down to 3 0'Clock. Two or 3 judges will head for the Model A Lawn, while the rest fan out across the show field to evaluate their assigned classes.







