Board Meeting October 22, 2025

The Zoom meeting was called to order at 7:05 PM by Milford Sprecher, President.

Board members in attendance included Milford Sprecher, Jeff VanGorder, Valerie

Faircloth, Don White, Douglas Tomb, Bruce Metcalf, Bill Sims, and Bill Bass. David Greenwood was represented by proxy by Jeff VanGorder, in accordance with Article VI, Section V of the club bylaws. A quorum was established, and Jeff VanGorder recorded the meeting minutes.

Milford Sprecher reported that seven Model A vehicles participated in the Rockville show. Douglas Tomb presented the Treasurer's Report, noting a current checking account balance of \$11,950.17 with \$10,000 earmarked for the purchase of an additional CD in October, as approved by the membership during the October Monthly Membership Meeting. With the purchase of the October CD, the Club will hold two CDs valued at approximately \$10,781.73 and \$10,000 respectively.

In the Activities Report, it was noted that the AFRH Car Show has been canceled. The Fall Picnic at Oak Hall is scheduled for Sunday, October 26, and the Christmas Party is planned for December 6.

The Programs Report announced that the November program will feature a comparison of cars available for purchase in 1931.

Under Old Business, the board discussed the Smith Compressor. As no interest has been expressed by the membership regarding its disposition, the compressor will remain in its current storage location for now. The board will explore alternative storage options for the future. Additionally, the Board Nominating Committee, consisting of Blane Abcock and Matt Krafft, is working on nominations for the 2026 GWC Board, with a finalized slate expected to be published in the November Script.

No new business was discussed during the meeting. The next Board Meeting is scheduled to be held via Zoom on November 26, 2025, at 7:00 PM. The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 PM.

For Membership, Jeff reminded attendees that 2026 dues are now being collected, with rates remaining the same as last year.


In Old Business, Milford noted the ongoing discussion regarding the Smith Compressor. The Club will continue exploring options for it and the GWC tool crib.

He mentions the nearly 300 members of the Club, and how it is fun to be around, to drive, to work on, and learn about the Model A Ford. But he also mentioned that it is fun to be around the people interested in Model A Fords too. Stan mentions the many reasons that some members don't drive their cars to Club activities. He urges them to reach out to other members for help, so they can join in on the fun. Asking others for help will "get started down a path that will return your car to the road."

The Nominating Committee had done their work, and had a listing of the slate of nominations for the November Club elections. There were 15 candidates raring to go. The installation of new officers would be at the Club Christmas Party.




While we may be finished with the expansion, there are plenty of ways to still be involved with the museum for continued projects such as the "My A Program" as well as the memorial bricks.


CRUM'S CHURCH SHOW

OF BLOCKS AND BEARINGS

I took my Model A engine to Gunther's Machine in Woodsboro, MD, for boring, decking, installing modern valve guides, and adapting for insert main bearings. On the way to them getting started, they magnafluxed my original block and two used blocks that I brought and found cracks. Finally, the fourth used block I brought them was crack-free. Then, the shop discovered that their line boring tooling wasn't small enough for Model A main bearings (1.770" diameter). I asked around a bit and White Post Restorations steered me to JB's Auto Machine https://www.jbsautomachine.com/ in Rosedale, MD. They are an old-style shop like we need and have the right tooling. Their backlog is four weeks, but I'm not in a position to shop around. Both Gunther's and JB's are about 75 miles from Fairfax, so not a bad drive for many, besides during rush hour.

The work that Gunther's has done is bore and hone the block for new pistons, polish the crank, press in modern guides, deck the top of the block, and clean the block in a parts washer. JB's will bore for main bearing inserts and cut for the brass (bronze?) thrust washers. I will install the valves and springs, the crank, if not already done, gap the rings, install pistons and rods and the camshaft. The lifter bores in the block were confirmed to fit my old adjustable lifters. My old insert main bearing caps had hollow dowels and I have to see if JB's needs them to install. My old rear main bearing cap was flawed, so I got a replacement from Don Temple.

I think this machine shop approach is a viable alternative to using a turnkey shop if you have the time. The biggest challenges were to find the local capable machine shops and an uncracked block. Being retired, my time is free and I had done the same assembly work 15 years ago. So far, the parts and machining should be less than a new Burtz block kit and half the cost of a Burtz short block (same configuration as I will get from the machine shop, except for my assembly).

For some light entertainment, look at the wrist pin retention hardware that I found on a piston from one of the cracked blocks I bought. You have to appreciate the skill involved in holding the nail just right to mushroom the end so that the nail doesn't fall out.
